Rev. Floyd S. Bailey has resigned as pastor of the Ione Community church and will accept a position as pastor of the Weiser Congregational church in Weiser, Idaho. His resignation goes into effect, April 20. He has been pastor here for two years coming here from Hemet, Calif.

Farmers Income Tax Guide Available From County Agents

Changes in income tax regulations that could save money for many farmers are explained in a new guide now available at county extension offices, reports Manning Becker, Oregon State College extension farm management specialist.

A 1959 edition of the farmers' Tax Guide has been prepared by the Internal Revenue Service for use by tax consultants and farmers in preparing tax forms, Becker said. County extension offices have a small supply that can be obtained free of charge while they last.

Changes include a new optional 20 percent depreciation allowance in the year of purchase on the cost price of personal property usable at least six years. Also, beginning with 1958, a net operating loss can be carried back three years instead of two. And casualty losses on property not covered by insurance can be treated as an ordinary loss deduction.
