Local Planning Set For White House Meet

To aid in planning for the 1960 White House conference on children and youth, a county meeting of key people is being called for this Thursday, March 19, in the jury room of the courthouse at 1:30 p. m. according to Esther Kirmis, temporary county chairman.

This meeting is the result of a district meeting conducted in Pendleton the past week to which representatives from public welfare, P-TA Congress, public health, and extension service from Baker, Gilliam, Grant, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa and Wheeler counties were invited to attend.

The White House conference is a national conference held every 10 years at the request of the President of the United States to aid in the coordination of program in education, recreation, child welfare services, mental and physical health, and juvenile protection, of our nation's children and youth. Governors of each state are asked to submit resolutions and send delegates to this conference scheduled for the week of March 27, 1960 in Washington, D C.

County representatives of the various agencies mentioned above are asked to form a core committee to inform as many citizens as possible the purpose of the 1960 White House conference on children and youth and consider the conference as it relates to the county program for children and youth.

Examinations Due For Local Postal Clerk

Postmaster James H Driscoll announced today that receipt of applications for civil service examinations for clerk positions in the Heppner post office will close April 4, 1959. Applications received after midnight that date cannot be accepted.

Applicants for civil service post office jobs must be U S citizens, at least 18 years of age, and must reside within the delivery district of the Heppner post office. Appointments to postal positions will be made from a register of eligibles established from the results of examination.

Both men and women are accepted as candidates for clerks. Pay for these jobs starts at \$2 per hour with automatic increases to \$2.42 per hour.

Marketing Quotas On Feed Wheat Are Ruled Valid

The law governing the wheat marketing quota program has been found constitutional by the U S Supreme Court and excess wheat will continue to be subject to marketing quota penalties even though it is fed to livestock on the farm, according to work received by chairman McBurney of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The Supreme Court's ruling, Mr McBurney said, came in the Texas case of U S vs Haley. In that case—a civil suit to collect marketing quota penalties—a federal judge ruled that the wheat marketing quota provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1958 were unconstitutional. He held that if all wheat produced on a farm is used or consumed on the farm, there is no farm marketing excess subject to penalty.

This decision was appealed by the Government and was reversed by a unanimous vote of the Supreme Court on February 24. The Supreme Court cited its original 1943 decision that the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 was constitutional.

Growers Need Complete Wool Sales Records, ASC Says

Chairman Rietmann of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office reminds wool producers to be sure that the sales documents they have received for selling wool during the past year contain all the information required under the wool incentive payment program.

It is particularly important, Mr Rietmann says, that the sales documents show the true net sales proceeds including deductions made for freight and other marketing charges. The county ASC office where the program is administered has the authority to adjust sales proceeds when charges are not shown. Where false information is filed, both the producer and the wool buyer are subject to penalties.

Producers will be eligible for payments to be made this year under the 1958 program for wool and unshorn lambs marketed not later than March 31 this year. Later marketings will be eligible for payments under the 1959 program.

Applications for payment under the 1958 program must be filed not later than April 30 at the county office. This cut-off date is necessary to permit a final accurate calculation of the average price received by farmers for wool during the 1958 marketing year. When the average price received for shorn wool is known sometime this summer, the payment rate will be announced and payments will be made to growers.

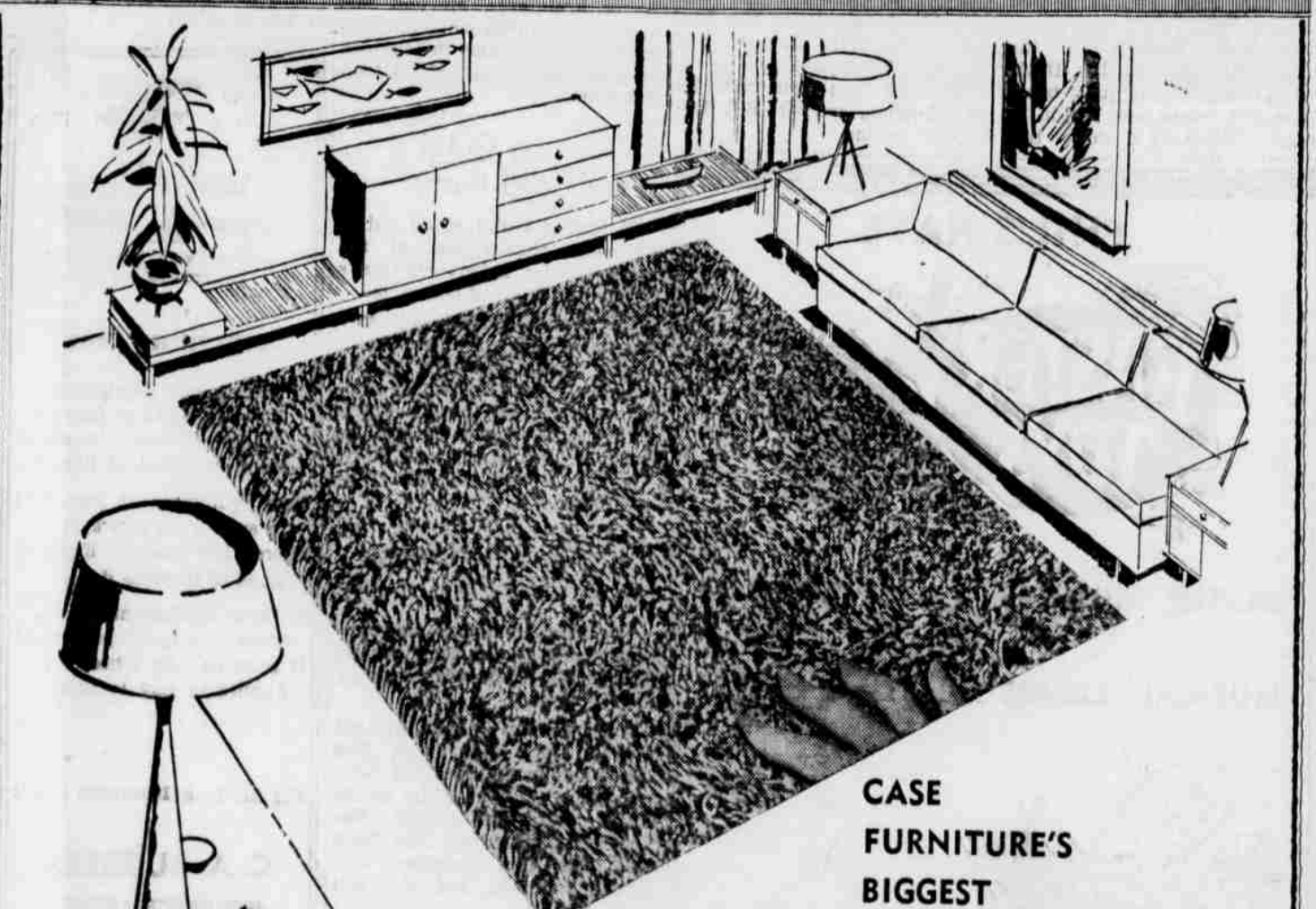
