

Chats With Your Home Agent

Every ten years, the President of the United States calls a great national conference devoted to the circumstances and prospects of the children and youth of the nation. This conference is known as the White House Conference on Children.

White House conferences on children have been held roughly at ten year intervals during this century—1909, 1919, 1930, 1940, 1950. Each of these conferences has exerted a direct and powerful influence on the welfare of the children of the United States. Each has been concerned with a problem typical of the decade in which it occurred.

The conferences have ranged in size of membership from several hundred to more than 5,000. Physicians, social workers, educators, community leaders, members of labor unions, civic group, religious leaders, parents—all who cherish and serve children—have taken part and contributed to the problems under scrutiny at the various conferences.

The idea for the first White

House Conference on Children originated with James E. West, a young lawyer who had been raised in Washington D. C. orphanage. As a young man he became a member of the orphanage staff directing the program for boys. It was in this background that his life-long interest in dependent children had its roots.

Soon after graduation from law school, West became associated with the child-rescue campaign being conducted by Theodore Dreiser, editor of the *Delineator* magazine. He and Dreiser went to the White House to discuss with President Theodore Roosevelt the needs of the dependent child. West suggested a national conference on dependent children to be sponsored by the president as a way to "greatly advance the cause of the dependent child."

The president called such a conference and the conclusions of this meeting still echo down the years: "Home life in the highest and finest product of civilization. It is the great molding force of mind and character. Children should not be deprived of it except for urgent and compelling reasons. . . . Except in unusual circumstances, the home should not be broken up for reasons of poverty. . . . Children who for sufficient reasons must

be removed from their homes, or have no homes, should be cared for in families, wherever practicable."

The result of this conference saw legislation that brought about foster homes for dependent children rather than orphanage care.

The children's bureau was also the result of this conference.

Further conferences have succeeded in pressuring legislation for the benefit of children. Federal and state child-labor laws, maternal and child health under the Social Security act, children's charter (19 statements as to what every child should receive from his education, health, and welfare protection) and help for the mentally retarded children are a few of the results of these conferences.

President Eisenhower has called a White House Conference for children for March 1960. Governors of the states have been charged with the responsibility of submitting resolutions of what each state would like to see done for their children. The governor, in turn, is turning to a core committee in each county for help with these resolutions.

The county core committee in our county includes Mrs Velma Glass, county health nurse; Lowell Challey, executive secretary, public welfare commission; Mrs E. M. Baker, youth activities chairman; Mrs Norman Nelson, chairman, home and community living committee; P-TA presidents: Kenneth Keeling, Heppner; Mrs Mike Matthews, Ione; Mrs Elwynne Peck, Lexington; Mrs Carl Hubbard, Irigoin; and Mrs Henry Zivney, Boardman; C. J. D. Bauman, Morrow county sheriff; Oscar Peterson, county judge; and myself as representative of the county extension staff.

Mrs E. M. Baker was voted to chairman this core committee, and I will act as recorder.

The duties of this core committee are to solicit recommendations from all organizations in the county that deal with children and youth and submit these resolutions to Governor Hatfield by June 15th. Your organization will hear from us in the near future as we are scheduling a public meeting on Tuesday evening, April 7 at the courthouse to inform the public of this White House Conference.

Oregon plans on a White House Conference of its own to be held in November 1960 to evaluate the resolutions that come out of the National White House Conference and see how they apply to Oregon. Pressure groups will then be formed to provide legislation for these benefits for Oregon's children and youth.

NOTICE OF SERVICE OF PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX WARRANTS

NOTICE is hereby given pursuant to ORS. 311.615 of the service of Personal Property Tax Warrants upon the following listed taxpayers. Payment of the following listed delinquent taxes with interest and costs of service must be made by April 9, 1959, or said warrants shall be filed with the County Clerk of Morrow County, Oregon to be entered in the judgment docket of said county and shall become a lien upon the title to any interest in real property owned by the person against whom the warrant is issued, and the taxes on personal property embraced in the warrant with interest, penalties and costs applicable thereto, shall continue as a lien on all the personal property of the person assessed as otherwise provided by law. The effect shall be the same as though the people of the county had recovered the judgment against the person charged for the full amount of the delinquent taxes covered by the warrant together with interest thereon and cost as provided by law.
