I've been skipping around like the proverbial "spring lamb" this past week. The lovely spring weather has made this "skipping" doubly enjoyable.

Our county committee, who represent the extension units in the county, met at the home of Mrs Al Fetsch, Heppner, on March 23. Discussion centered mainly around the Homemakers Festival to be held at the Ione grange hall on April 30th. I submitted a rough draft of the script for the pageant, "Yesteryears of Morrow County" which will be presented by the various units the afternoon of the festival.

There will be 10 episodes to the pageant: The Coming of the White Men and The Great Migration, by the Irrigon unit; Earl Settlers of Morrow County; Pine City unit; What Was Pioneer Living Like, Lexington, Heppner and Pine City units; The Pioneer Church, Ione; The Pioneer School, Lena unit; Pioneer Social Life, Rhea Creek; Early Villages in Morrow County, Heppner, Hardman, Ione, Lexington, by the Heppner, Rhea Creek, Ione and Lexington units; 20th Century towns — Irrigon and Boardman, by Boardman unit; and The Dedication by Pine City unit.

Units are now busy collecting costumes and stage properties to make this one of the outstanding events in Morrow county's celebration of the Oregon Centennial.

Nels Anderson, county extension agent, and myself visited the Boardman P-TA on Thursday afternoon and presented "The 4-H Story" with the assistance of 4-H members from the three clubs in Boardman. We welcome these opportunities to inform parents of many projects available in 4-H work and the need for leaders.

That same day we took Mrs Maureen Malone, Mrs Mildred McQuaw, Mrs Roy Partlow and Kurt Gantenblen, Boardman 4-H leaders with us to the home of Mrs M E Hadwick, Irrigon. There the Irrigon and the Boardman 4-H leaders sat down to discuss the selection for members for 4-H summer school to be held in Corvallis, June 20-27, and the solicitation of 4-H scholarships from organizations and business places in the area.
