Mr and Mrs Ted Hewitt and daughters are visiting in Centralia, Wash.

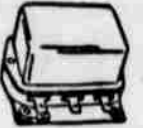

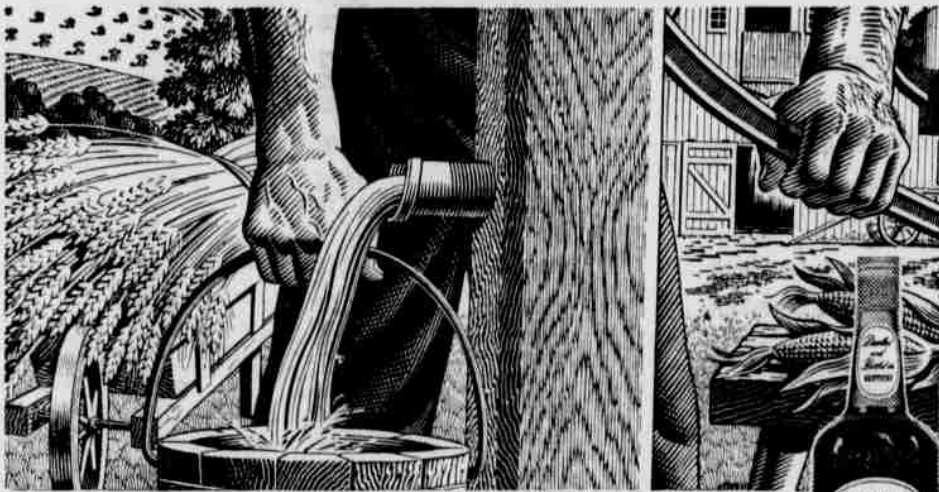
