## District Women's Club Convention Held at Boardman

"Any woman can do the job she has to do when she wants to do it," said Mrs Dexter O Arnold, Concord, N H, third vice-president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, at the annual convention of the 4th District of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs in Boardman Wednesday of last week. Mrs Arnold, whose subject was "No Ceiling on Miracles," further stated that most of our clubs are as we want them to be. She urged the clubs to seek new members and suggested that campaigns be held to get them. She said, "The Woman's Club gives me knowledge of what is going on in the world. We should be concerned not only with the club, but with the state, nation and the world. What we do today in Oregon is important to women in foreign lands."

Mrs Arnold has held top positions in the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the League of Women Voters and the American Association of University Women. Her activities as a club-woman have taken her on trips throughout the United States and Europe. She spent nine summers abroad from 1930 to 1939. On one of her trips, she accompanied a student group to the Salzburg Festival in Austria. A graduate of Syracuse University, Syracuse, N Y, she has served as director of speech dramatics in the schools of Syracuse. She is author of a textbook on speech, and has done extensive work in play-writing. In 1952 the University of New Hampshire named her "New Hampshire's Most Distinguished Citizen."

The Boardman Tillicum Junior Woman's Club was host for the convention, which was held in the school gymnasium with nearly one hundred women attending from Umatilla, Morrow, Sherman and Wasco counties. The Boardman school children presented two square dances, with Mrs Zoe Billings in charge.

Mrs Carl Johnson, Weston, introduced the club's vice-presidents. Mrs Skoubo introduced the convention committees, and Mrs Tatone presented the distinguished guests, who were besides Mrs Arnold, Mrs Walter Brown, Klamath Falls, president of the O F W C, Mrs Fred Gast, Portland, first vice-president, Mrs W A Burnap, Corvallis, 2nd vice-president, Mrs Gerald C Day, Portland, financial secretary, and Mrs Marion T Weatherford, Arlington.

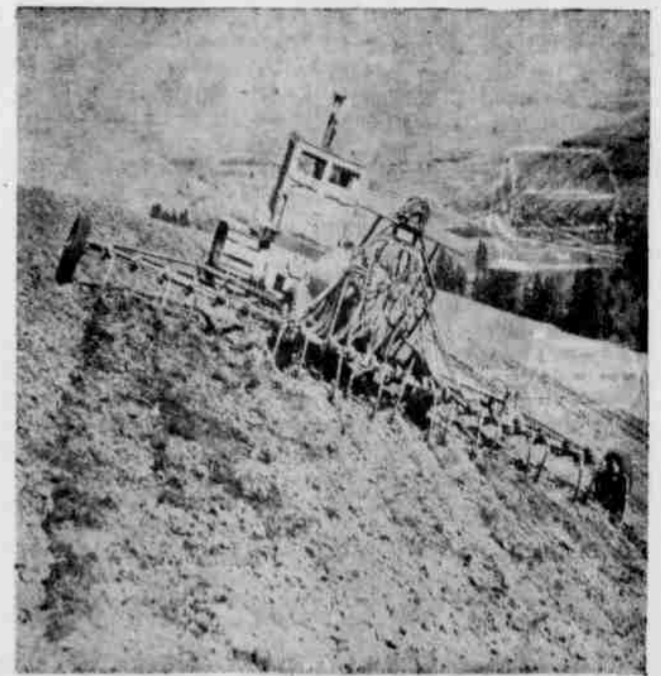
Mrs Marion T Weatherford, Arlington, gave the hospitality response.

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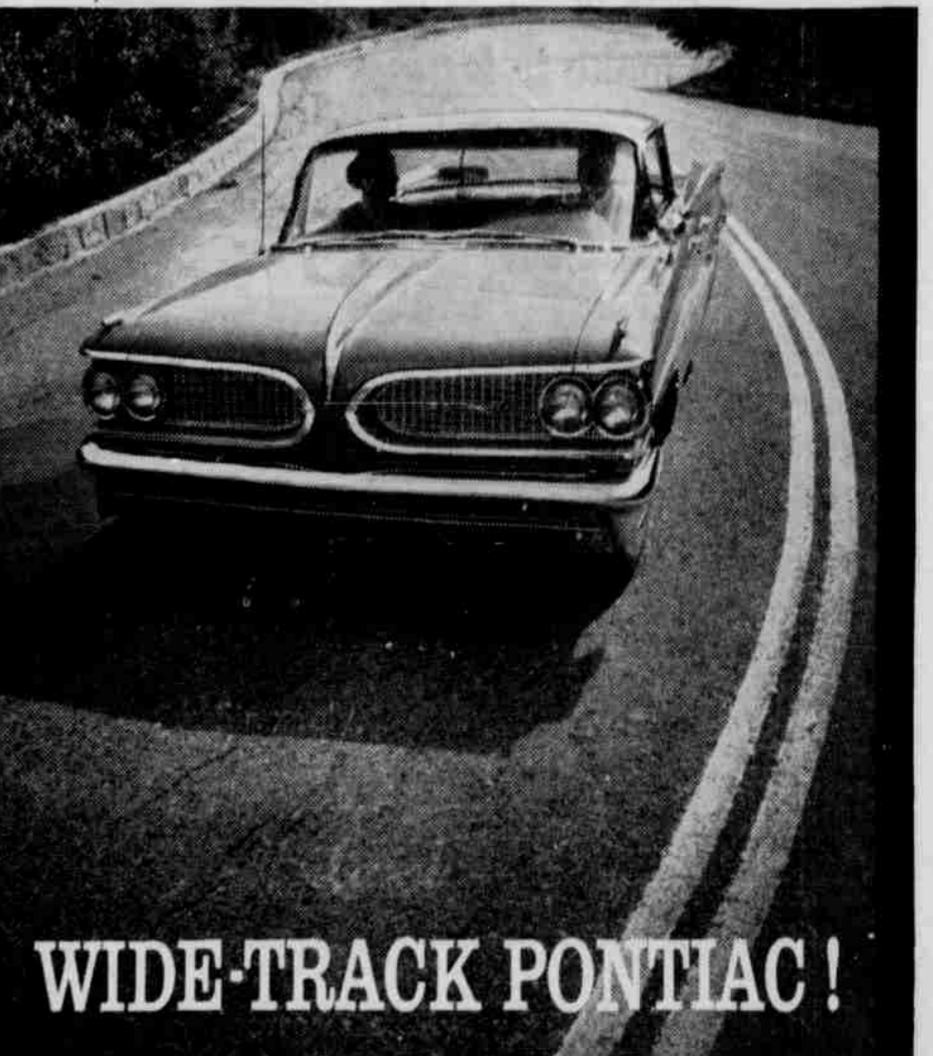
