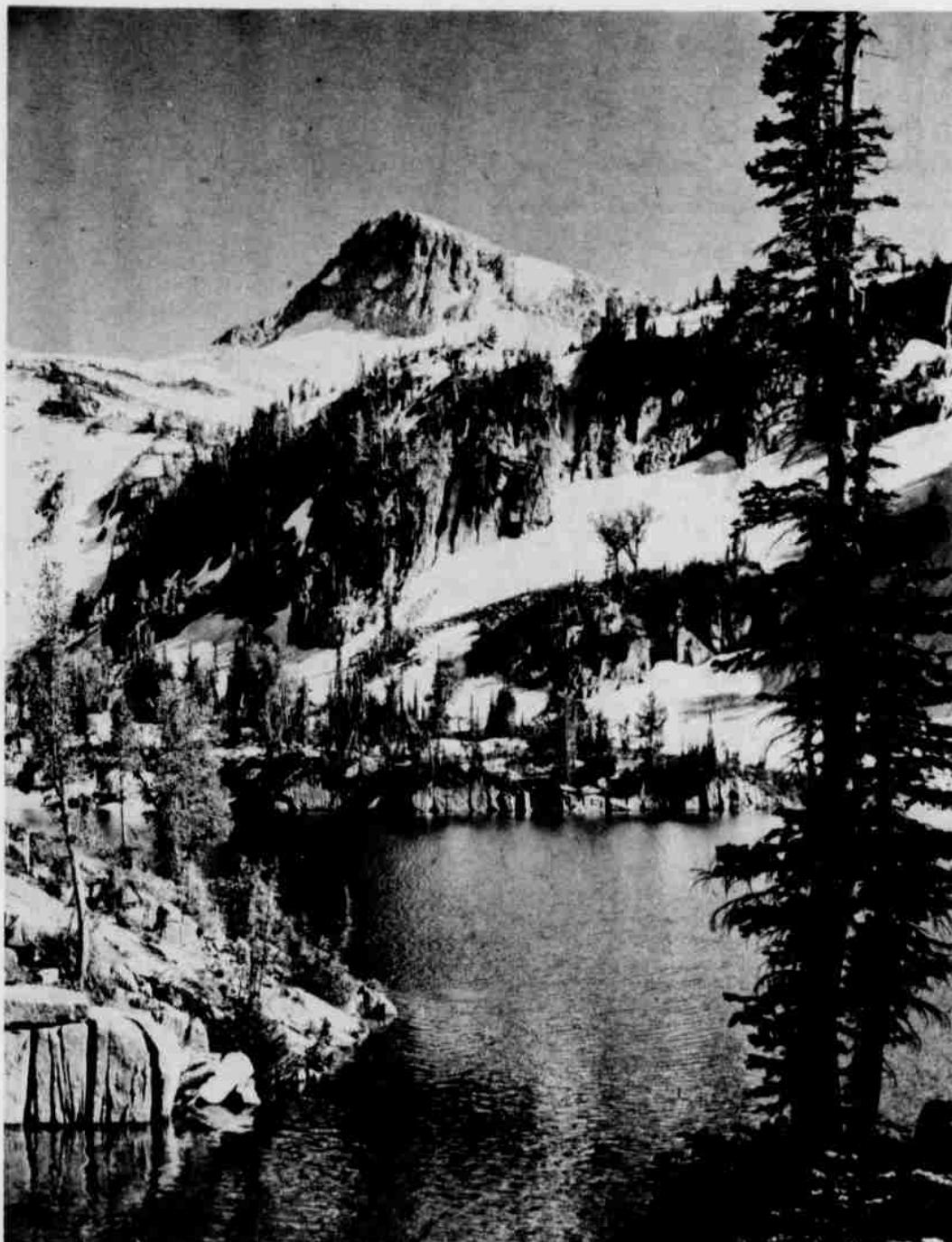

Higher Education Expands

22 Public, Private Institutions Developing
Nearly 25,000 Students for Useful Careers

With eight state-conducted and 14 independently directed institutions, higher education in Oregon is easily available to qualified students in all areas of the state. Close to 25,000 students are enrolled in one or another of the institutions, which are finding it no easy matter to keep up with the flood of enrollment that has burst in on them in the last 15 years and which has not yet reached its expected peak.

State-owned institutions are the University of Oregon, at Eugene; Oregon State College, Corvallis; Portland State College; Oregon College of Education, Monmouth; Southern Oregon College, Ashland; Eastern Oregon College, La Grande; University of Oregon Medical School, Portland; Dental School of the University of Oregon, Portland; and the Portland Extension Center operating under the General Extension Division of the State Board of Higher Education.

Private Colleges Strong

Thirteen excellent private colleges, some of them nationally famous, are Reed College, Lewis and Clark College, University of Portland, Multnomah College, and Cascade College, all situated in Portland; Willamette, at Salem, and Pacific, at Forest Grove, strong institutions dating back to the beginnings of Oregon; Linfield College, at McMinnville; George Fox College, at Newberg; Marylhurst College, at Marylhurst; Mt. Angel Seminary, at St. Benedict; Mt. Angel Women's College, at Mt. Angel; Northwest Christian College, at Eugene. All these institutions have been authorized to offer teacher training.

The State Board created by the Legislative Assembly in 1929, organized in 1932 the present State System of Higher Education, putting the aforementioned eight institutions, previously managed by individual boards of regents, under unified and coordinated direction. Specialized technical and professional curricula were allocated among the institutions in a way to achieve the greatest possible integration and coordination.

Land-Grant College Authorized

Under the national land-grant statute (Morrill act) of 1862, the Oregon Legislative Assembly in 1968 contributed to the support of Corvallis College until in 1985 it was taken over wholly as a state institution, Oregon State Agricultural College, later called Oregon State College. Integral parts of the college are the schools of agriculture, business and technology, defense education, education, physical education, engineering and industrial arts, forestry, home economics, and pharmacy. Research is conducted at the institution by the forest experiment station of the Department of Agriculture, the Science Research Institute, and the college's graduate school. Extension of a cooperative nature in agriculture and home economics is conducted under the direction of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Enrollment at Corvallis is well over the 7,000 mark.

The University of Oregon was established at Eugene in 1872 and opened in 1876. The first building, Deady hall, incidentally, is still in service, housing classrooms and, substantially repaired, is still in fair condition after 83 years of use.

Allocated to the University are, besides departments of arts and sciences, the schools of architecture and allied arts, business administration, education, health and law, medicine, and music. Both institutions hold annual summer sessions. Enrollment in the University this year is more than 6,000.

Strong Hospital Center

The University of Oregon Medical School, started in a small downtown Portland building in 1887, was expanded in 1913 when the medical department of Willamette University was merged with it. In 1919 the school was moved to its present site on Marquam Heights, Portland, where the first building, MacKenzie hall, named for the school's dean, was erected. Several other buildings have since been added, including the 277-bed hospital, which, costing \$6,300,000, was dedicated in 1956. Other hospitals located adjacent to the campus are the 310-bed Multnomah county hospital and the 300-bed hospital erected for U. S. war vet-

erans. Enrollment is limited to 300 students.

The Dental School of the University originated with the consolidation of the North Pacific Dental College, of Tacoma, and the North Pacific College of Oregon. The college, whose buildings costing \$2,200,000, were completed on the campus of the U. of O. Medical School in 1956, limits its enrollment to 320, designed primarily to serve the Pacific Northwest area.

Three colleges operated primarily for the training of public school teachers are the Oregon College of Education, at Monmouth, enrollment about 800; the Eastern Oregon College, at La Grande, with

600; and the Southern College, at Ashland, with approximately 800.
