The Rock Hounds met at the home of Mr Joe Baltrinus last Saturday evening. After a short business meeting, our program chairman, Randall Peterson, introduced his guest, L L Robbins, who has inherited a rock saw and tumbler and is interested in learning to use them. What fun there is in store for him—once that rock is set in place and the saw blade begins cutting through it, then is the time when excitement mounts high in anticipation of what that first cut will reveal; and after the first cut comes the second and third—each just as exciting as the previous one—and maybe more so! Oh the beauty that is hidden in the rocks just waiting for us to find it. The saw exposes this beauty and the polisher magnifies it.

And now to tell you something of the beautiful collection that Mr Baltrinus has. Can you imagine finding the colors of the rainbow in a highly polished black glassy rock? Well, that's exactly what you saw when you looked at a piece of his rainbow obsidian. There were beautiful shades of blue, turquoise, brown, red and green in the highly polished slabs and cubes of agatized wood that have been obtained from various parts of the country. There was a piece of smoky agate about six inches across that was simply covered with hundreds of minute clear quartz crystals that gave the appearance of snow as one looked down on them. How the crystals glistened and sparkled as the piece was held in the light. But to make the piece more interesting, beautiful, and unusual were the clusters of slightly larger amethyst crystals that had formed in groups right in the midst of these small clear quartz crystals. The beauty of the combination of lavender and snow white in the crystal world can never be expressed in words. It would take pages to describe the other specimens there—one must see to believe and we were surely glad for the opportunity to visit there.

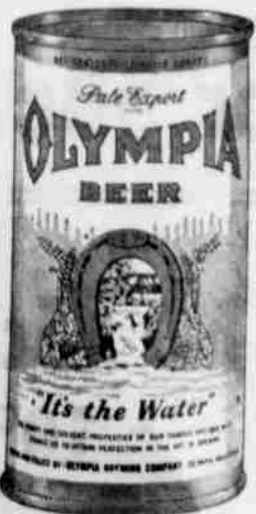
The program finished with refreshments and the film, "Glass and You." On May 16 at 8:00 p m we will meet at the ranch home of Mr and Mrs Harold Evans.

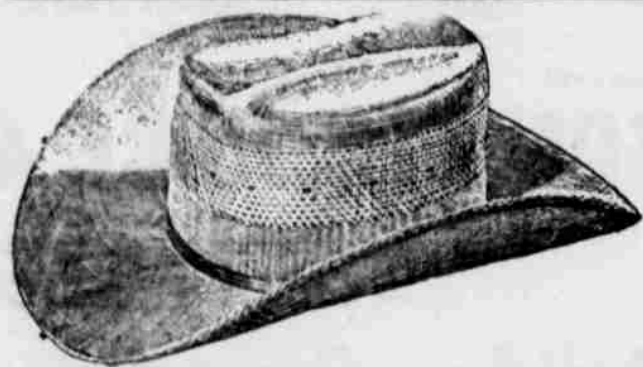
