First National Announces New "Ready-Credit" Plan

A revolving loan account combining checking privileges with the flexibility and economy of bank credit will be introduced throughout the state in several weeks by First National Bank of Oregon. It was announced by C B Stephenson, president.

The new plan will be called "Firstbank Ready-Credit," and is the first plan of its type to be introduced on a statewide level, the bank president said.

"One of the major advantages of a "Ready-Credit" account is that a borrower can, in a sense, make himself a loan at any hour of the day or night or on any holiday and either in or out of town", Stephenson declared.

A customer who has established a "Ready-Credit" account can borrow anytime by simply writing a check against his commitment. The checks will be a special personalized form and will be charged directly to the customer's "Ready-Credit" account. Complete details of the plan will be announced later.

The outstanding loan balances will be automatically covered by a life insurance plan for added protection of the borrower's family.

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Home Orchards Spray Schedule Issued by OSC

A new spray schedule to help home gardeners protect their fruit and nut trees against insects and diseases has been published by the Oregon State College extension service.

The folder presents a simplified timetable that keeps the number of sprayings to a minimum, and recommends spray materials that can be purchased almost anywhere. It doesn't meet the exacting requirements of commercial orchardists, however.

Spraying schedules are listed for apple, pear, peach, cherry,

prune, apricot, walnut, and filbert trees. Time of spraying is keyed to blossom and leaf development of the tree at different seasons.

A table is included giving information on the various insecticides and fungicides recommended. Directions are given for mixing either one-gallon or 50-gallon quantities of spray.

The new circular, titled "Spray Schedule for Home Orchards," was written by Iain C Mac Swan, OSC extension plant pathologist, and R W Every, OSC extension entomologist. Oregon residents can obtain a free copy at their county extension office, or from the OSC bulletin clerk, Corvallis.

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









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
