

Little League Ball Season Now Under Way

Little League baseball play got under way Monday with the Glants getting the first win at the expense of the Indians by a score of 7-0 in 4 innings. The Glants used two pitchers to shut out the Indians with Donny Munkers starting and Sherrill McDonald coming in for relief in the 4th. They struck out seven men and walked four.

The Indians also used two pitchers with Gene Helker starting and Tony Doherty relieving in the third. They combined to strike out three men, allow four walks and six hits with the score ending 7-0 for the Glants.

On Tuesday the Braves took a free scoring 10-7 win from the Dodgers in a six inning game. The Dodgers started things off in the bottom of the first with three runs on four hits and the Braves picked up two runs on two hits in the top of the second. The Dodgers then picked up another run in the second and the Braves went ahead in the top of the third with a four run spurge. The Dodgers picked up a run in each of the 4th, 5th and 6th innings for their seven runs on 12 hits, still not enough to overcome the Braves who picked up one run in the 5th and three in the 6th.

The Dodgers pitched Doug Dubuque with Bill Snyder relieving in the 4th. They struck out 12 men and walked nine. Their outstanding hitters were Bill Snyder, John Koenig and Dubuque.

The Braves used one pitcher, Tommy Green who allowed seven runs on 12 hits and six strikeouts. Outstanding hitters were Carl Bauman, Tommy Green, David Anderson and Paul Hsler.

Games will be played this summer five evenings a week starting at 6 o'clock, playing until dark. Four complete innings but not more than six innings must be played to make the game official. Each team will play nine games in each half through June and July. The winners of the two halves will play off for the right to compete in the tournament in Pendleton the first of August.

Start Being Made On Broadened March Of Dimes Program

Representatives of 11 Eastern Oregon county chapters of the National Foundation met Monday at Pendleton to have spelled out a "beginning" patient aid program in arthritis and birth defects, thus completing a transition that began last July when the March of Dimes organization announced it would broaden its attack to include these two diseases as well as polio.

The organization, originally known as the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, already has launched research and professional training attacks on arthritis and birth defects.

Under the broadened policy March of Dimes help will be offered to local children under 19 with certain defects of the brain and spinal cord, with juvenile arthritis, and, as in the past, with paralytic polio.

Mrs Jack Loyd, Morrow county chapter chairman who attended the meeting, said, "We would like to make it very clear at the outset of this broadened program that we will continue to fulfill our basic obligations to polio patients needing assistance. However, payments no longer will be made for non-paralytic polio."

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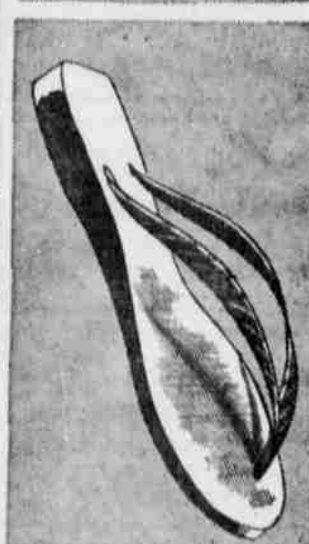
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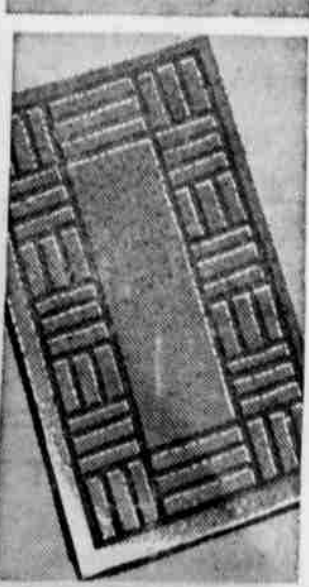
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
