The purpose of submitting to the legal voters of

said sub-districts, the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1959-1960 over the amount limited by Section 11, Article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reasons for increasing such levy are: 1. The low tax base, due to the fact that some districts lost their base entirely and others could only be increased by the legal allowed 6% per year. 2. Increased costs in maintaining buildings and making needed repairs. 3. Increases in teaching and administrative salaries. 4. High cost of supplies and equipment and repairs to some of our older buildings. 5. Amount allowed for purchase of school property.

The total base of all sub-districts in the Morrow County School District (operating under the County Unit Plan) is \$173,118.61.

The amount of tax, in excess of the 6% limitation, proposed to be levied for the said fiscal year (1959-60) is \$445,286.18.

HATFIELD EVALUATED

There is considerable apparent substance in reports that Eastern seaboard kingmakers promoted the recent weekend trip of Gov Mark Hatfield to their smoky room bivouacs to look over the young vote-getting marvel and estimate his vice-presidential opportunities.

Oregon taxpayers were at no expense for his trip. The kingmakers paid all the bills.

Saturday he spoke before a meeting of members of the New York City Businessmen Assn. After breakfast Sunday with Gov Rockefeller, he occupied the pulpit of Marvel Collegiate Church, being introduced by Norman Vincent Peale. Sunday evening he addressed an Adult Youth meeting. Monday the Governor delivered the commencement address at Houghton College.

Gubernatorial Appointments

An artillery officer overseas veteran and assistant commander was appointed state adjutant general and head of the Oregon National Guard by Gov Mark Hatfield Tuesday. The appointee, Brig Gen Alfred E Hintz, in his civilian career has been a Portland police patrolman 22 years. He resigned to accept the state military post that has an annual salary of approximately \$9,000.

His military career includes 25 years service in the Oregon National Guard.

H G (Fod) Maison was reappointed as superintendent of state police and Dr Allan L Ferrin, Salem was appointed as a member of the State Board of Medical Examiners, just before Gov Hatfield left for the East.

Supreme Court Actions

The Oregon Supreme Court denied damages Tuesday to a woman who cut her knee on a strip of metal underneath the dashboard of a car that had been borrowed from a LaGrande garage.

A Union County Circuit Court Jury denied damages to Mrs Florence Miller who sought the financial relief, but Circuit Judge Lyle R Wolff ordered a new trial.

The Supreme Court decision, by Justice William C Perry, reinstates the jury's verdict, and reverses Judge Wolff's order for a new trial.

In another action the high court reversed a Baker County judgement in a case involving the sale of a motel. The decision by Justice pro tem James W Crawford in a suit by Mr and Mrs Warren A Spencer against Jacqueline A Ellis, found fraudulent misrepresentation as to the motel's income, and revoked the contract. It was a victory for Mrs Ellis who had appealed.

Keep Tiny Cars At Home

The use of small gasoline-powered vehicles in any location other than on private property is illegal. Not only is it a violation of the law, but also represents a potentially dangerous situation. They cannot legally be driven on public streets or roads the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission has reminded owners or prospective buyers.

They cannot be licensed to operate on public ways because they lack much of the equipment required for operation of a regular motor vehicle. As an example the toy cars set so low

they are difficult for a driver in a standard car to see.

The commission warned that improper use of the toy vehicles could easily result in a tragedy, and pointed out that it is the responsibility of parents to supervise children in their proper use.

Even if they had the required equipment, the operator still would have to be 16 years of age and be a licensed driver in the state, the commission commented.

The miniature vehicles represent a new problem not only to Oregon, but other states as well.

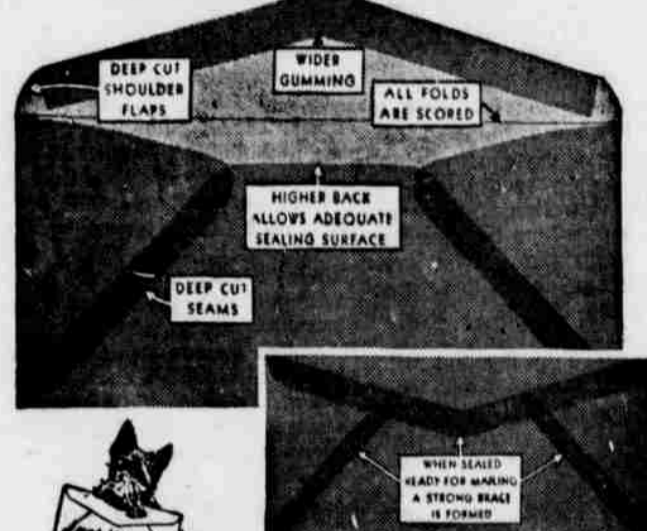
