For the Braves the outstanding hitters were: Thomson, and Pettyjohn. The Braves used three pitchers who struck out 4 men, allowed 14 hits and 18 runs.

The Glants still went about their winning as they went wild in an error filled game to beat the Indians 20 to 11. McDonald and Jay Ball combined to defeat the Indians allowing 11 runs on 4 hits and struck out 8 players. The Indians used two pitchers to try to stop the Glants allowing 20 runs on 11 hits and striking out 5. The Glants picked up runs in each of the four innings with Massey and Mattoon getting a home run apiece. The Indians got their runs in the 1st, 3rd and 4th for a total of 11.

Northwest Tour to Visit Four County Hereford Ranches

Twenty-one leading purebred cattle growers have been selected as Oregon's section of the Four State Northwest Hereford Breeders Tour which will be held June 15 through July 1. The tour, that is expected to attract cattlemen from Canada as well as the United States, is the first of its kind to be sponsored by this many state associations. The Hereford organizations of Montana, Idaho, Oregon and Washington are sponsoring the event. Starting at Sun Valley, the tour will be completed 17 days later on the coast of Washington after seeing 79 herds of cattle in the sponsoring states.

KARL BEACH LEAVES FOR NATIONAL 4-H CONFERENCE IN WASHINGTON

Oregon's four top 4-H club citizens for 1959 will take a six-day look at national government and their own 4-H club program at the 29th national 4-H club conference, June 13 to 19, in Washington, D C.

The Oregon delegates left Portland June 10 at 1 p m, and will return June 25. The conference is composed of 200 delegates, four from each state, and Puerto Rico, as a reward for outstanding 4-H club work.

Making this year's trip are Karl Beach, 17, Lexington; Dale Anderson, 17, Gresham; Kristine Hansen, 17, Bend; and Suzanne Lozier, 20, Enterprise. John Schmid, Deschutes county extension agent, will accompany the delegates.

Delegates were selected for their maturity, citizenship, high ideals, leadership, ability to meet people, and records of 4-H achievement in their home community. All were interviewed at a state 4-H club government conference in Salem last March.

During their stay in Washington they will visit government and historic sites around the Capitol, learn about the federal government by attending assemblies and taking part in group

discussions, and share ideas with other 4-H'ers on the improvement of the 4-H club program.

The formal opening of the national 4-H Club Center will highlight this year's conference. The center is home for the National 4-H Foundation, and located about 10 miles from downtown Washington.

Educational tours will be made to the Capitol, the White House, the Agricultural Research Center at Beltsville, Md, the department of Defense at the Pentagon, Mount Vernon and the Supreme Court. At the Capitol, delegates will hear a panel of legislators discuss "What Happens on Capitol Hill." They will learn how an agriculture bill becomes law, and how federal budgets are made. After the conference, Oregon's delegates will visit the United Nations in New York. They will take pictures during the entire trip to share with club members at home.

Karl Beach has completed six years of 4-H work. Along with projects in sheep and beef, he has been a 4-H camp counselor and junior leader. His parents, Mr and Mrs Harold Beach, operate a 2240 acre ranch near Lexington. Beach will enter West Point in July.

FARM OPERATING LOANS ARE NOW AVAILABLE THROUGH FHA OFFICE

Operating loans are now available through the Farmers Home Administration.

Operating loans are made for the purchase of machinery, livestock, equipment, fertilizer, seed, tractor fuel and other farm and home operating expenses needed to carry out efficient farming operations on family-type farms. In some instances, a loan may be made for the refinancing of existing debts.

Loans are also available to applicants who have part-time employment off the farm provided they are established farmers conducting substantial farming operations and spending the major portion of their time farming. Such operators must have dependable sources of outside income.

Operating loans are repayable over periods of 1 to 7 years with the interest rate at 5 percent.

The amount that can be loaned is based on the needs and the ability of the borrower to repay. The loan must be sound.

The ability to repay a loan made for operating a family-type farm is determined by the earning capacity of the farm and the operations the farmer intends to carry on. The Farmers Home Administration supervisor assists each loan applicant in preparing a complete farm and home plan.

No loan can be made unless this plan shows the farm income to be sufficient to provide the family a good living, pay operating expenses, cover depreciation costs, pay debts and leave a reasonable amount for reserve.

Every borrower is expected to keep a complete record book to determine what direction he should take in each farm enterprise, to show his progress, and for income tax purposes. At the end of the year a review is made of the year's operations, and a new farm and home plan is prepared.

To be eligible an applicant must be a citizen of the United States, have had satisfactory farm experience or training, and be unable to obtain credit from other sources at a reasonable rate. He must also have, or be able to rent, a suitable family-type farm.

A local county committee determines the eligibility of each applicant. The committee is composed of three men, two of whom must be farmers. Additional information regarding these loans may be obtained at 105 S E Byers Avenue, Pendleton, Monday through Friday between 8:00 a m and 4:30 p m. Monday is the regular office day.
