

Vacation Schools End at Boardman

Daily Vacation Bible school closed Friday at both the Community church and the Good Shepherd Lutheran church with programs being presented in the evening.

Theme of the school at the Community church was "Living For Jesus In The Space Age." The total enrollment was 69, with an average attendance of 59. The beginners and primary classes tied for first place in the space race attendance contest, which was based on percentage.

The program opened with salutes to the American flag, the Christian flag and the Bible. The beginners presented two flannel-graph stories and sang three songs. Their theme was "We Learn About Jesus."

The primary class, whose theme was "Jesus The Good Shepherd," told stories and sang songs to point out the theme.

The juniors showed the memory verse wheel and gave story and scripture on "Christian's Birth and Growth."

A round table discussion on "Answering God's Call" was held with Toni Taylor as moderator.

The Bible school's offering goal was \$45.00, and \$45.79 was collected. It will go to put God's word behind the Iron Curtain.

State Starts Job of Renewing 14,000 Brands

Owners of about 14,000 livestock brands recorded in Oregon will be called upon to renew their rights to the brand beginning July 1. Each five years brands must be re-recorded with the state department of agriculture at Salem to keep them current.

The re-recording period now coming up will last for six months and applications filed now will continue legal ownership through December 31, 1964.

"Every brand owner of record today will receive within the next few weeks an application form upon which to renew his brand", announces Fred Pope, animal division chief for the department. No renewal fees should be mailed until iron owners receive the official application blank from Salem.

He also pointed out that re-recording procedures have been simplified as a result of 1959 legislation. Principal change omits reffling of a blotter impression of the brand. Also under amendments to the brand law, the department is this year lowering the price of re-recording when an owner renews the same brand for both cattle and horses. This combination price is \$8 as compared with a straight \$5 for single brands.

Claims to brands for animals and poultry are waived if the recorded brand is not renewed within the six-months re-recording period beginning July 1, the department reminds owners.

Brand owners who have moved may not receive the department notifications which will be mailed to the last address on its records. Anyone who does not get a notice of re-recording during July should notify the State Department of Agriculture, 158 12th Street, N E Salem, early in August and a form will be mailed.
