

## Giants Hold Lead In Little League

The Giants are still leading the race in the first half of Little League play. There are two more games to be played and one tie game to be continued. Tonight (Thursday) will be the Giant-Dodger game and tomorrow, Friday June 26, the Indians and Dodgers will finish their tie game and play a make-up game. These three games can still make a difference in the top place standings.

On June 18, the Braves added another win to their column as they took the Dodgers 7-4 in a close pitcher's duel. The Braves started things off in the first inning with two runs on two hits, but the Dodgers came right back in the bottom of the first with 3 runs on two hits and picked up another run in the 2nd on one hit to go ahead 4-2. The Braves were held scoreless until the 4th inning where they gathered 5 runs on one hit to take the lead, which ended the scoring for both teams. Dick and Snyder pitched for the Dodgers giving up 7 runs on 6 hits, 8 walks, and 5 strikeouts. The Braves used David Anderson who allowed 4 runs on 6 hits, and struck out 8 men.

Last Friday the Braves continued on their winning ways with a 10-6 win over the Indians. A very well played game with no errors although each team got a number of hits. The Braves picked up 7 runs on 7 hits in the first 2 innings and 3 more in the 5th innings for their 10 runs on 9 hits, while the Indians picked up 1 run in each of the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th innings and this got in 3 more runs in the top of the 6th for 6 runs on 10 hits. Pitching for the Indians were Peterson, Helker and Robinson who fanned 7, walked 10, giving 10 runs. The Braves pitcher Doherty walked 1, fanned 3 and allowed 6 runs.

In a wild game Monday the Dodgers clung to a 16-15 win over the Giants. The Giants picked up runs in every inning to get their 15 runs on 14 hits. The Dodgers were held scoreless in the first two innings, then started banging away to pick up 16 runs on 12 hits. Both teams played ragged with numerous errors and overthrows allowing unearned runs.

The largest delegation ever to attend 4-H summer school on the Oregon State campus left Morrow county Saturday morning for the week long stay. Dancing, outdoor sports, swimming, band and chorus are special activities.

## Pacific Telephone To Build Relay Station Near Here

An invitation for bids on the construction of a one-story concrete block building at Blackhorse mountain, just north of Heppner was issued by Pacific Telephone today, according to manager D A Short.

Dimensions of the building are 17 by 39 feet. Specifications call for a concrete slab floor, concrete block walls and wood joist roof. The new building will house radio relay equipment used to provide additional long distance facilities for SAGE. It will be located approximately on the site of the test tower that was erected on the top of the buttes about a year or so ago.

The project also calls for the erection of an 8 by 12 foot prefabricated metal building on a concrete slab and a 100 foot self supporting metal tower which will be furnished by Pacific Telephone.

Bids will be opened at 2 p m June 23 in the office of C M Twelves, chief engineer for Pacific Telephone in Oregon. Current schedules call for construction to start in July and be completed by December, Short said.
