Summer Day Dishes



Good, cool and easy to do! Can you beat that for summer cooking? Made to order is this molded cranberry salad, especially summery with its frosting of cottage cheese.

For quick, cool main dishes canned spaghetti is a "must" on the hot weather shelf. Serve it plain, with tuna, Vienna sausage or use the flavorful recipe below.

Frosted Cranberry Salad

1 pkg. lemon flavored gelatin 1/2 cup chopped pecans
 1 1/4 cups canned orange juice Salad greens
 1 can (1 lb.) cranberry sauce 1 cup cottage cheese
 1/2 cup chopped celery 2 tablespoons mayonnaise

Dissolve gelatin in hot orange juice. Add cranberry sauce; stir until blended. Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Add celery and pecans; put in mold. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp greens and frost top with cottage cheese and mayonnaise mixed together. Six servings.

Last-Minute Shrimp Spaghetti

1 small clove garlic 1 can (1 lb.) spaghetti
 2 tablespoons bacon fat in tomato sauce
 1 can (4 1/2 to 6 1/2 oz.) shrimp 1/4 teaspoon celery salt

Cook minced garlic in fat until tender. Add drained shrimp, spaghetti and celery salt. Heat. Three to four servings.

When I was down for a food preservation workshop at Oregon State College in April we had many of our meetings in the food technology building. We were taken on a tour through the building one morning and I was amazed at the many projects being carried on.

Better foods for Oregon shoppers is the aim of Oregon State College research. Consumer acceptance, improved marketing and new uses for Oregon's agricultural abundance are objectives of food technology research now in progress or recently completed at OSC.

New methods of processing are foreseen by college scientists as they explore the possibilities of freeze drying and irradiation of foods.

In freeze drying, food is frozen, dried under vacuum, and stored on the pantry shelf. OSC is investigating freeze drying of meats which retain their original shape, and restore to natural flavor and juiciness when reconstituted.

Atomic radiation may also prolong the market and storage life of meats, fruits and vegetables, as shown in OSC and other tests. Oysters, precooked seafoods, crab, shrimp, sablefish, scallops, fish cake and smoked cod will be irradiated in this year's tests.

New recipes for dried apples, chicken and green beans, are also being developed in OSC "test kitchens". With the help of a new

drying procedure, apple "dices" have developed that reconstitute 3-4 times as fast as older methods. Bakers and consumers both want dried apples that can be reconstituted immediately and added to pie shells or other baked goods.

Oregon's Blue Lake green beans are taking on new forms as precooked frozen green beans sticks and croquettes, that can be heated, and are ready-to-serve.

Canned chicken and dressing loaf and chicken "sausages" are two of the new uses for bits of chicken that are being investigated.

Mrs Vela Eubanks and grandson, Leonard Eubanks of Portland visited relatives here over the weekend.

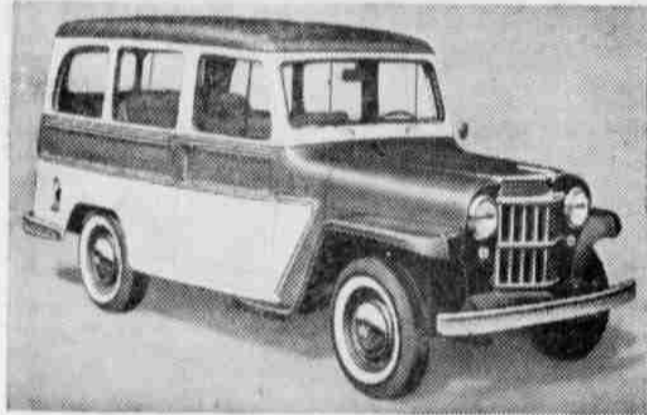
