

Giants Win First Half Title In Little League Play

The Giants clinched the first half Little League title after trouncing the Braves June 24, 23 to 4 and then winning their makeup game the following night 12 to 9.

The Braves opened the game with the Giants with 3 runs on one hit and collected one run in each the 3rd and 6th innings on one hit for their 4 runs. The Giants came back in the bottom of the first to get three runs on no hits and went on to score runs in the 3rd, 4th and 5th innings for their 23 runs on 10 hits. The Giants' pitcher Ken Smith allowed only two hits, walked 7 and fanned 11 men. The Braves used Doherty, Green and Pettyjohn to pitch a 23 run 10 hit game. They struck out 6 and walked 12.

The Giants held off the Dodgers in the 4th inning when they picked up 5 runs on three hits to go ahead and win 12 to 9. The Dodgers picked up 6 runs in the 1st, two in the 2nd and one in the 4th while the Giants got runs in each of the four innings for 12 runs on 7 hits. The Dodgers pitched Snyder and

the Giants used Munkers and Driscoll.

The Dodgers won the tie continuation game from the Indians in the 8th inning with one run on one hit. The Indians got two hits but both men were stranded on base. The game had been called at the end of seven innings because of darkness with the score tied at 8 to 8. They finished it June 26.

In four innings the Dodgers won a 7-0 game from the Indians. Dubuque held the Indians hitless until the 4th when they got one hit. He walked two and fanned four. The Indians pitched Doherty who walked three, struck out three and allowed 8 runs on four hits.

This ends the first half of Little League play with a close race among the four teams. The second half will resume on Monday, July 6 with the Giants and the Indians clashing in the first game.

TWO COUNTY GIRLS ON ROYAL COURT AT McNARY AQUA CAPERS JULY 4-5

At one o'clock on both the 4th and 5th, festivities on land, on the water, and in the air will start the second annual McNary Aqua Capers on Wallula Lake. On the 4th a 49 gun salute from a 75 millimeter howitzer will boom out the official opening. It will also salute our 49th state as the new flag is hoisted to the top of the pole near the reviewing stand.

A long line of boats carrying beauties of Eastern Washington and Oregon will parade past.

Boat races will be held outside the islands where six Coast Guard patrol boats will be on hand to control traffic. The Tri-Pass Ski Club from Eugene will start the afternoon's water skiing off with a few minutes of expert stunts. Following this there will be water skiing competition for junior and senior amateurs. On the polo field the Umatilla Sage Riders will play four chuckers of palmetta polo.

On the 5th only there will be motor cycle scramble races east of the polo field. At the east end of the lagoon there will be swimming, canoeing, and water safety demonstration by Hermiston swimmers, and skin divers whose regular work is with the State Industrial Accident Commission.

Toward evening the Tri-Pass Club will thrill spectators with more acrobatics, kite riding and ski jumping. The Hermiston Flying Club will put on aerial acrobatics and a four sack bombing demonstration at the same time. The Umatilla Sage Riders will stage an equestrian drill toward

shutdown.

In the evening a pageant telling the story of the early days on the Columbia River will be held. Significant in it will be the use of horses and canoes. A colorful square dance under lights will be one of the gay moments of early Oregon. The dance will be conducted by the HI Nighters and invited guests.

Fireworks will start at 9 p. m. Throughout the program brief introductions will be made of visiting royalty as well as members of the Capers' own court of 12 beautiful girls.

Admission is by serialized buttons which are good for two days at any time and by ticket for each day which can be purchased only at the gate.

The location of McNary Aqua Capers is a spot on the south shore of Wallula Lake, east of Hart Rock State Park. It is about 10 miles northeast of Hermiston and about eight miles east of Umatilla off route 730 about one mile. A new road branches off the park road a few yards from route 730, which takes spectators directly to the location without having to go through the park at all. It is one-way. The old access road will be used as the "out" road.

The royal court for the Aqua Capers includes, besides queen Sharrá Birrer of Arlington, Linda Heimbligner of Ione and Lorelei Hamilton of Boardman. There are also nine other princesses.

Included among the visiting royalty at the affair will be the members of the 1959 Morrow County Fair and Rodeo court.
