

Upset Opens Second Half of Little League Play

The second half of league play started off with an upset of the league leading Giants by the Indians and a runaway game between the Dodgers and Braves with the Dodgers winning.

The Indians starting things off in the game Monday, getting 4 runs on 1 hit in the 1st inning and 4 more runs on no hits in the 2nd to lead 8 to 0. They picked 1 run in each the 3rd and 4th innings for 10 runs on only 2 hits. The Giants were held scoreless until the 3rd when they got 2 runs on 2 hits, picked up 6 more runs on 4 hits in the 4th, and 1 run on 1 hit in the 6th for 9 runs on 9 hits but not quite enough to overcome the Indian lead.

The Dodgers scored in every inning in an error-filled ball game gathering 18 runs on 9 hits. The Braves were held scoreless in the 1st but picked up 4 runs in the 2nd, on a grand slam homer by Jimmy Doherty, then got 1 run in each of the 4th and 6th innings for 6 runs on 6 hits. The Dodgers used two pitchers; Bill Snyder and David Matheny who combined to fan 6, walk 8, and allowed 6 runs on 6 hits. The Braves used 3 pitchers; Tom Green, Dave Anderson, and Steve Pettyjohn who struck out 10 men, walked 12, and allowed 18 runs on 9 hits.

After two games in the second half of the league play the Indians and Dodgers are tied for first with 1 win and no loss and the Braves and Giants tied with no wins and 1 loss. There are 16 games to be played yet this half with games being played each week-day evening beginning at 6:00 P. M.

The Farm Team and Pee-Wee team met in an exciting 3-inning game Tuesday afternoon. Both teams scored in each inning with the Pee-Wee's staying enough ahead to go on to win 10 to 8 for their first win in the 3 games that the two teams have played. College-on-Credit Plan Announced by First National

A college-on-credit plan will be pioneered in Oregon by the First National Bank of Oregon, it was announced by C B Stephenson, president of the state-wide banking system.

To be known as the Firstbank college education plan, the new concept will enable responsible parents or sponsors to buy on all-important college education for their son or daughter on a monthly installment basis just as they buy their home or automobile.

The First National plan has been hailed by educators and public officials throughout the state as a program which will make it possible for many more students to secure a higher education.

"Our decision to pioneer this plan in Oregon was prompted by the urgent need of qualified students who would be unable to secure a college education in any other way," C B Stephenson, bank president, explained.

The parents may contract for an unsecured personal loan for a period up to six years, with the money being paid by the bank to either the parents or the school in equal installments at the beginning of each college term.

The loan funds may be used to pay any of the normal expenses which students incur—transportation, tuition, books, room and board, etc.

The plan is designed primarily for parents or other relatives who are Oregon residents, but the student may attend any approved public or private college or university in the country.

The college education plan carries with it life insurance provisions which insure that the loan funds will continue to be available for the student's education in the event of the death of the parent or guardian, and at the same time cancel the indebtedness.

Should the parents need assistance to augment other funds in the amount of \$4,000, for example, for a complete 4-year college education, the funds advanced by the bank would be repayable at the rate of \$63.48 per month for 72 months. Adjusted programs for two or three years will be available for students who have already started college.

Oregon's Centennial Chairman, Anthony Brandenthaler, was wise, as in all things so far, when he perceived and avoided a major distraction by dating the 100 days duration of the exposition midway between the Legislature's elastic term and the beginning of the forthwith political campaign. He must have had his political sagacity in high to reckon so accurately that the 1960 political activities would be 'going confusingly before the frost was on the pumpkin.'

There will have to be considerable local trumpeting if both parties get the oil and candidates ready for filing dates, now only a few months away.

On the Democratic side State Representative, Mrs Beaulah Hand, Milwaukie, is presiding as chairman of the Central Committee, following the unexpected death of Chairman David Epps who died in a Salem hospital last week. He had served signally as state chairman for the past 18 months.

The bulk of the pressure to fill Dave Epp's place—which is almost an executive one—is on three very prominent Democrats, Howard Morgan, Senator Monroe Sweetland, and Robert J Steward. It is doubtful that any of the trio will be persuadable.

Morgan who took over when Democratic losses were accepted as normal, elected the first Democratic governor Oregon had for nearly a quarter of a century.

Senator Sweetland, designer of recent Democratic strategy, owns edits and publishes the Milwaukie Review that is growing faster than the booming city of Milwaukie. He is supposed to have a joust with Secretary of State Howell Appling when the new secretary runs for election. Robert Steward and Howard Morgan are having more fun and making more money than ever before. They have recently extended their vast cattle ranches.

These three doubtlessly will be in the unavailable list of candidates for central committee service.

The selection of a Democratic state chairman has been postponed until after the Dave Epps Memorial Dinner in Portland, August 10.

Considerable "fall out" among Democrats is expected when U S Senators Wayne Morse and Richard Neuberger bring their lances to Oregon during the campaign.

PRaises CENTENNIAL
 Chairman Anthony Brandenthaler of the Oregon Centennial Commission this week received a communication from Washington stating that Assistant Secretary of State, Francis O Wilcox, was favorably impressed with the Oregon Centennial Exposition, during his recent visit.

The assistant secretary further said that the exhibits from such nations as Ghana and other under-developed countries were among the most outstanding ever to be displayed in the United States.

He concluded his remarks by saying that he appreciated inspecting the exposition through the courtesy of the Centennial

commissions chairman.

LIVESTOCK BRANDS

Owners of about 14,000 livestock brands recorded in Oregon are being called upon to renew their right to the brand by the State Department of Agriculture. Each five years brands must be re-recorded with the department at Salem to keep them current.

The re-recording period will last for the next six months and applications filed now will continue legal ownership through December 31, 1964.

No renewal fees should be mailed until iron owners receive the official application blank from Salem.

Re-recording procedures have been simplified as result of 1959 legislation. Principal change omits re-filing of a blotter impression of the brand. Also the price of re-recording has been lowered when an owner renews the same brand for both cattle and horses. The combination price is \$8 as compared with the straight \$5 for single brands.
