

Chats With Your Home Agent

Last weekend I visited the National Indian Encampment that held forth in Pendleton all last week, and came back with a deeper appreciation of Indian customs, dances, and ceremonies.

Sixty-two tribes from all over the northwest encamped at the Round-Up village bringing their loveliest Indian maidens, their best athletes, their wives and children. All in all it made us quite a panoramic sight. Pendleton is used to having its Indians around at all times, but I never experienced such a large number as this encampment.

You very likely have been reading about the "convention" in the daily papers so know pretty well that each afternoon the Redmen gathered in the arena and vied with each other in contests such as the bow and arrow; war dances, hoop dance, tepee raising, lance throwing, hide race, and buffalo hunt, and other exhibitions. Winners of the afternoon contest appeared in the Happy Canyon arena each evening to perform. Each tribe, I understand, took turns in presenting a performance every evening. The Umatilla tribe of Oregon presented "The early days of the Umatilla" in tableaux form on Saturday evening when I saw it. (This started with the little boy going through the rites of manhood and ended with the feeble, old squaw left

behind to die as the tribe moved on.)

The encampment was completely Indian directed. Therefore you didn't find everything run off per schedule, as white man things should be run. It seems the Indians took their own good time, and kind of improvised their program. I understand the Pendleton Chamber of Commerce and the radio and newspaper people were a little bewildered as to what to expect and how they could be of any assistance.

The colorfulness of their costumes, their pride in performing their dances and ceremonials, the interesting displays of their arts in the Indian museum, and the evidence of their Christian beliefs were all things that impressed me and gave me a little insight into the ways of our fellow Americans.

We welcomed a new agent into our county extension family last week. He is Joe Hay of Salem, Oregon who graduated from Oregon State College in 1958, and has done a stint in the National Guard this past year.

Joe will assist with the agricultural and 4-H program in the county so you will see him around at the Morrow county fairs and other events.

He is young and unattached (as yet) and is looking for a small furnished apartment. If you have one call the county agent's office.

Morrow county is not completely strange to Joe. A few summers ago he helped harvest at the Earl McKinney ranch near Ione.

I know you'll welcome him as warmly as you did me a year ago.

County agent N C Anderson and I have been meeting with fair committees in both ends of the county this past week.

On Thursday we met with 4-H leaders of North Morrow at the M E Hadwick home in Irrigon to make plans for the 4-H activities of the North Morrow fair to be held September 3, 4, and 5 at Boardman.

Plans were made for the leaders to meet at the fair building in Boardman for general clean-up on Thursday morning of the fair. Entries will be accepted in the afternoon of that day.

Friday morning of the fair will see the judging-showmanship contest of 4-H livestock members and judging contest in foods and clothing for the home economics boys and girls. Demonstrations will take place Friday afternoon along with a style revue judging. A public style revue will be held on Friday evening of the fair at the Boardman school gymnasium when the 4-H girls, enrolled in clothing, will model the garments they have made. Special entertainment will be added to the revue on Friday night to make a complete program.

The highlight of the convention will be a special public talk on the last day of the gathering, titled "When God Speaks to All Nations". This will be delivered by a special representative of the Watchtower Society from Brooklyn.

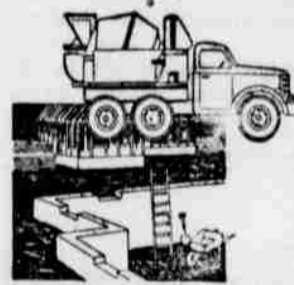

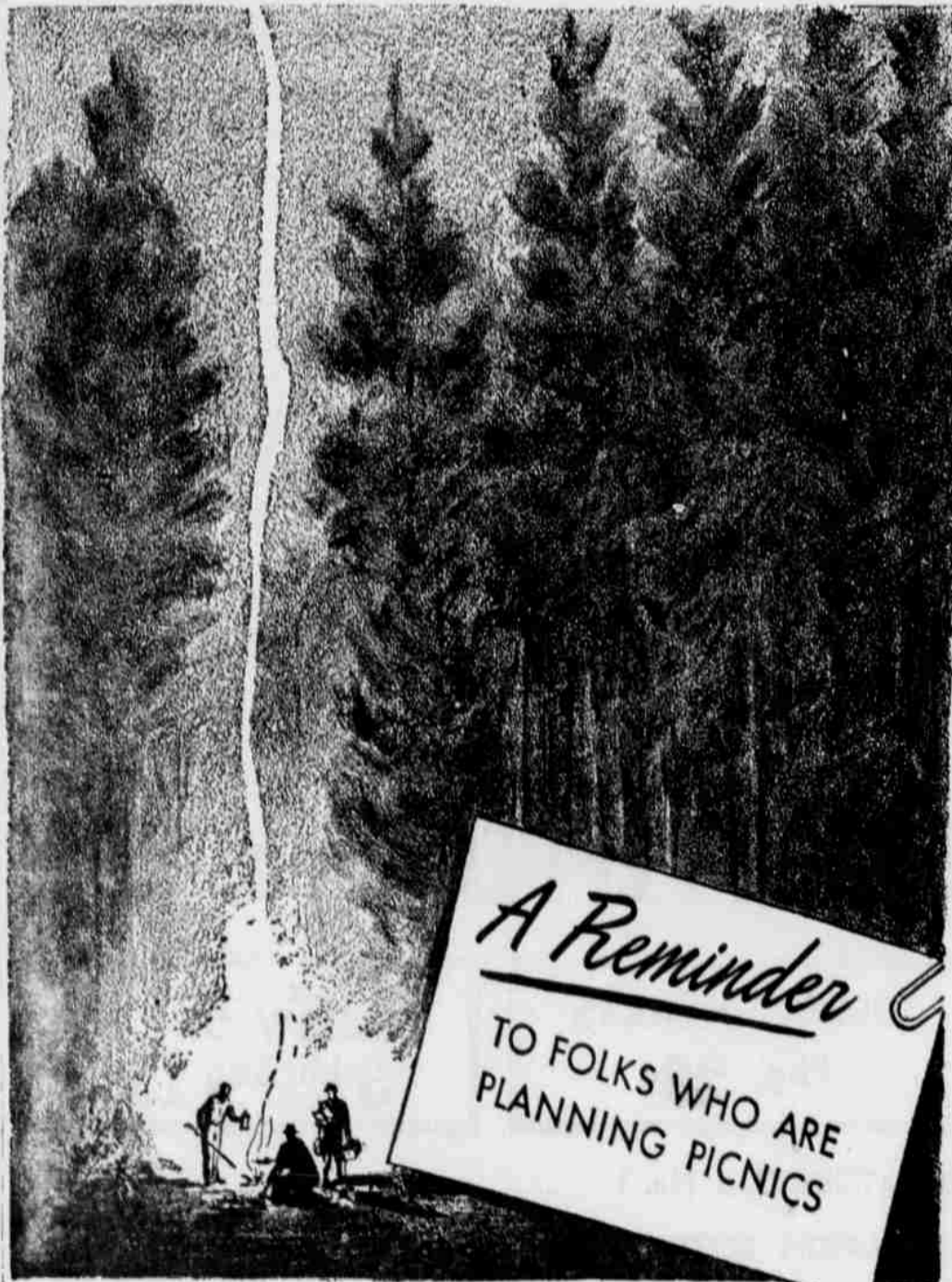
