County Bond Sales Climb During June

Seventeen counties in Oregon showed increases in Savings Bond sales last month compared to June, 1957, according to a report received here today.

In making the figures public, county savings bonds committee chairman Jack Bedford said, "state-wide sales in June amounted to \$2,264,958 compared to a total of \$2,438,170 a year ago. Our E and H Bond sales in this county last month amounted to \$9,363, compared to \$4,200 in June of 1957."

While the report indicated that sales in Multnomah county eased off slightly in dollar volume, they were almost doubled in two of Oregon's other large counties, Clatsop, and Klamath. Even greater percentage increases were reported in Curry, Hood River, Morrow, Sherman and Willowa counties.
