WAGONS ROLL INTO MORROW—

"Hoss Stealing" Trial Highlights Wagon Train Visit to County



(1) CROSSING MORROW COUNTY—The famed Oregon Cavalcade Wagon Train is making its way down highway 30 near its Tuesday night stop at Boardman. The Morrow county Fair and Rodeo royal court met the train near the county line and rode with the group.
