Registration for Riverside high school at Boardman will start at 9 a. m. Thursday, Sept. 3, according to Jack Flug, Boardman superintendent. All teachers are to report to the building Tuesday, Sept. 1. Classes will start Tuesday, Sept. 8. There will be no school Labor Day.

Members of the faculty are as follows: Jack Flug, social problems and business law; Ronald Black, vocational ag I and II, shop I and II and biology; Mrs Ruth Coy, commercial, English and Library; Robert Strutz, mathematics, football and baseball coach, and boys physical education; Richard Waymire, basketball coach; Mrs Nancy Leroux, English; Lester Leroux, chemistry, physics and science; Muriel Ley, home economics and girls physical education; W Edelman, band and chorus, and grade school music. Mrs Edelman will work in the school office.

The Boardman grade school will also start Sept. 8, and following are the teachers: Mrs Zoe Billings, first and second grades; Mrs Harold Baker, third and fourth; Mrs John Partlow, fifth and sixth.

Mrs Charles Graham and Mrs Roy Ball are the cafeteria cooks; bus drivers are Edward Skoubo and Robert Harwood, and Harwood is also the school custodian.

Several changes have been made in the arrangements of rooms of the school. The old gymnasium has been remodeled into two large classrooms, the library has been extended to take in the class room next to it, thereby making the library much larger, and a new home economics room has been made in the basement.

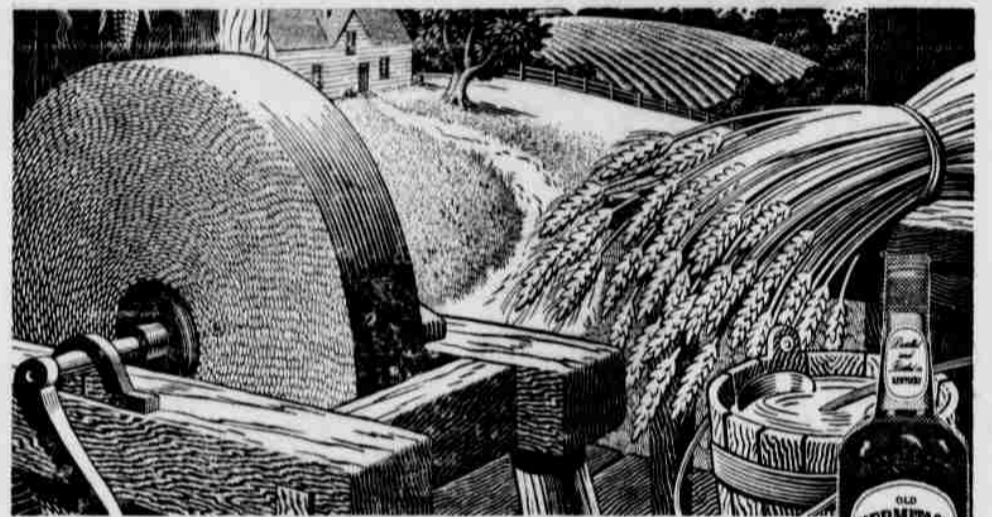
