

North Morrow Fair Opens At Boardman Sept 3

Thursday, Sept 3, will be the opening day of the annual North Morrow County Fair in Boardman. All entries must be in by 6 P M on that day. Judging of 4-H and FFA livestock will start Friday morning. All 4-H Home Economics exhibits must be in place by 8 a m Friday, but exhibits will be taken all Thursday afternoon. The Danish System will be used in judging Home Economics exhibits, including the Style Revue. Demonstrations and special contests will be judged on the American System.

The Style Revue will be held Friday evening at eight o'clock in the Boardman school gymnasium. There will be a revue practice at the gymnasium Friday afternoon at three o'clock.

There will be entertainment at the grounds both Friday and Saturday. At 10 a m Saturday the parade will start from the school house and go through town to the fair grounds. There will be prizes for the best floats and a prize for the best novelty float. In the afternoon a bicycle parade will be held at the grounds, and a pig scramble at 1 p m. Various kinds of races will be held at the grounds Saturday afternoon.

4-H CHAMPION SHOWMAN TROPHY WON BY KENNETH LYNN SMOUSE

A grand champion livestock showmanship trophy was presented to Kenneth Lynn Smouse, Ione, at the 1959 Morrow county fair. The presentation was made Friday evening just before the 4-H livestock sale according to Joe Hay, Morrow county extension agent.

Smouse, the champion sheep showman, had close competition by Doug Anderson, champion swine showman; Billy Doherty, champion beef showman; and Jimmy Martin, champion dairy showman. To be eligible to compete for grand champion livestock showman, a boy must have

won the champion beef, sheep, swine, or dairy showmanship, Hay said.

The trophy was donated by N C Anderson, county extension agent.

Trophies for senior and intermediate showman of beef, sheep, swine, and dairy were donated by Morrow County Grain Growers. Junior division trophies for the same classes of livestock were donated by Jordan Elevator Company.

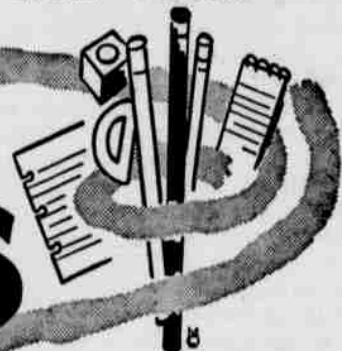
