Champion Lamb Brings 95c at Fat Stock Sale

One of the best 4-H fat live-stock sales ever held at the Morrow county fair in Heppner saw Dennis Doherty, Heppner receive 95c per pound for his grand champion fat lamb. This was the highest price paid for any animal at the Friday evening sale according to Joe Hay, Morrow county extension agent.

Doherty's lamb was bought by George Curran, Lena area rancher.
First National Bank, Heppner, bought the reserve champion lamb which belonged to Kenneth Lynn Smouse, Ione. He received 75c per pound for his lamb. All lambs sold at an average price of 32.2c per pound, Hay said.

Eric Anderson, Heppner, received 82 1/2c per pound for his grand champion steer. The steer was bought by Morrow County Grain Growers.

Heppner Pine Mills bought the reserve champion steer belonging to Richard Watts, Boardman, for 65c per pound. Average price received for all fat steers was 38c per pound.

The grand champion fat hog owned by Doug Anderson, Heppner, sold for 75c per pound. It was bought by the Koenig children. The reserve champion fat hog sold for 72c per pound. It was owned by Jerry Anderson, Heppner. The buyer was Bruce Giddens of Hermiston.

All fat hogs sold graded U S No 1 and brought an average of 37c.

Don Wink, Hermiston, auctioneer, was presented a plaque for donating his services over the past years for the 4-H sale.

Sixty-three fat animals were sold at the Friday evening sale. Twenty one were hogs all grading U S No 1. There were 17 steers all grading either prime, high choice or choice. The 25 sheep graded prime, choice and good.

Several dairy helpers were also sold at the sale.

Americans Spend Record Dollars On U S Farm Food

Americans spent more money for U S farm foods last year than ever before. Although most of the additional money went to pay a record marketing bill, U S farmers found themselves a little better off at the end of the year. Stephen Marks, Oregon State College extension economist, reports.

Some Oregon farmers also shared in this improvement, but many did not.

The nation's farmers received about 7 percent more from consumer food spendings last year due mainly to higher prices received for farm products and a slight increase in marketings. However, during the past 10 years, U S farmers did not fare as well as might be expected from the sharp rise in amount consumers spent for farm-produced food. The total marketing bill jumped 54 percent since 1949 but the farm value of food products sold rose only 23 percent.

Reasons behind the bigger grocery bill and explanation for it are given by the OSC economist. Americans are buying more U S produced farm foods, a trend that has continued almost steadily during the past 10 years, right along with the growing population. But consumers are also choosing more prepared and processed foods. Part of the rise in the total marketing bill reflects the increase in purchasing power coupled with consumers willingness to spend for added services and conveniences.

Much of the rise in marketing charges stems from increases in the amount of processing, packaging and other services. Increases in wages, salaries, transportation, prices of containers, packaging materials, machinery and other items bought by marketing charges.

Last year consumers spent a total of nearly \$37 billion to cover the food marketing bill, a 4 percent increase over the year before, and nearly two thirds more than the 1947-49 average. Marks says this marketing bill represents the total charges for all marketing services performed from the time the farmer sells the food until the consumer buys it.
