FUND DRIVE SET FOR HOSPITAL AIR CONDITIONING PROGRAM

Plans are being announced this week for a fund drive to obtain money to air condition Pioneer Memorial hospital. The plan is outlined in the following letter from the hospital's board:

For quite some time your Pioneer Memorial hospital has been in need of air conditioning. As explained previously in this paper by a letter to the editor from the president of the board of trustees, P W Mahoney, the cost of said air conditioning would be approximately \$20,000.00.

It is impossible to raise this amount out of operating expenses, as it is the sincere desire of the board of trustee and the management to provide the best possible care at the lowest possible cost to their patients. It is true that Pioneer Memorial hospital is holding its own financially except for the maintenance fund. The maintenance fund is provided for by taxes and is used only for upkeep or improvements of the plant.

The foregoing therefore indicates that the only way to air condition Pioneer Memorial hospital would be thru a special tax levy or donations from the public.

Recently Pioneer Memorial hospital received a very generous donation in the amount of \$5,000.00 from the Heppner Pine Mills Inc. By unanimous decision of the board of trustees and with full approval of the donor, it was decided to put said amount into a trust fund to be used toward the installation of a central, refrigeration type, complete air conditioning unit.

From estimates obtained by the board of trustees it has been determined that a considerable saving can be made by the installation of a complete unit over installing any system piece meal. In this type of system most

of the working parts would be concealed and in so doing would not mar the beauty of the hospital. The so-called swamp or wet methods of air cooling are not a desirable type for a hospital. The proposed unit if installed at one time would meet the standards required by the State Board of Health.

It is the desire of the board of trustees and the management to start a fund drive in the later part of September, 1959 and their goal will be an additional \$15,000.00.

Pledge cards will be presented to all Morrow county residents with a deadline for pledges to be paid by March 1, 1960. This deadline of March 1, 1960 would enable us, if our goal was reached, to have the air conditioning system installed and in operation before next summer's heat.

Pioneer Memorial Hospital Auxiliary has kindly offered its assistance in the fund drive and the board of trustees contemplate on some other residents of the county to assist with same.

We sincerely hope that when the solicitors call on you, you will give or pledge generously. One never knows when one will need the hospital. If it would happen during the summer heat air conditioning would surely help a great deal toward ones comfort. 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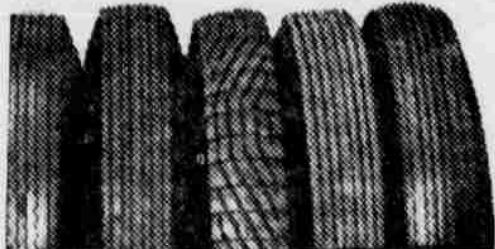
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
