

# Boardman Girl is Top Showman at N Morrow Fair

Irene Potts, 14, Boardman, was named all-around grand champion showman of the North Morrow County Fair here Friday. She took five champion honors. She showed the champion dairy female, took grand champion dairy showmanship, senior dairy showmanship and was champion in beef showmanship to gain top all-around grand champion.

Reserve all-around grand champion was David Skoubo, 10, Boardman, who showed a Landrace gilt.

Reserve champion in dairy showmanship was Chloe McQuaw, Boardman. In senior dairy showmanship Irene Potts was first, Chloe McQuaw, second, and Patti Partlow, third, Boardman.

Junior dairy showmanship first went to Anna Mae McQuaw, second to Jim Partlow, third to Sandra Thorpe, and fourth to Roy Obermeier. All of the above winners were from Boardman.

In class of helpers, 1 year and under 2 years of age, Jim Partlow, Boardman, was first showing a Guernsey; Roy Obermeier, second, showing a Holstein; Sandra Thorpe, third, Holstein.

Class of helpers calved in 1959, Anna Mae McQuaw, first, showing a Guernsey.

Chloe McQuaw placed first showing the producing Jersey cow. Second was Toni Taylor, Boardman, showing a Guernsey, and Patti Partlow, third, showing a milking Shorthorn.

Reserve champion dairy female was shown by Chloe McQuaw.

In open class, fat lamb, Anna Obermeier, second; goat, Kathy Getz, first; barrow, Gary Beeler, first; gilt, David Skoubo, first; Guernsey heifer, Teresa Thorpe, first; Jersey heifer, Chloe McQuaw, first; Angus heifer, Anna Mae McQuaw, first; Hereford

heifer, Anna Mae McQuaw, first; Hereford heifer, Bob Taylor, first; all winners from Boardman.

Richard Watts had the grand champion of the beef stock division in FFA Judging. Douglas Shattuck had the reserve champion.

Keith Gronquist was first in cows three years and over. Shattuck was first in heifers 18-24 months. Watts was first in heifers 12 to 18 months, and Bill Getz was second.

Gronquist was first in heifer calves 6 months. Watts was both first and second in calves under 6 months.

In the dairy division, Kurt Gantenbein had the grand champion, showing a Holstein. The reserve champion, a Jersey, was shown by Basil Beeler. Gantenbein had the best Jersey heifer 12 to 18 months.

Gantenbein had the best Holstein 12 to 18 months and the best Holstein 6 to 12 months. Watts showed the best milking Shorthorn cow.

Beeler had the grand champion swine. He also was first and second with his Chester White gilts, first and second with his Montana gilts, and first with his Hereford boar.

Shattuck had the top cross-breed feeder lamb.

Despite cloudy skies a good crowd was on hand for the parade, which started Saturday morning at ten o'clock, and for the races and other entertainment at the fair grounds for the last day of the fair.

The Catholic church float won first prize in the parade, the Good Shepherd Lutheran church was second, and the Boardman Tillium Club was third. A prize for the best novelty float was awarded to the Boardman 4-H Livestock Club. Judges for the parade were Dewey West, Sr of Arlington, and Jess Young of Ir-

rigon, first.
