

Mustangs Bow Before Elgin; Condon Next

Friday night Heppner dropped its opening grid game of the 1959 season to Elgin 27 to 6. It was the Mustang's first A-2 game.

Heppner won the toss and elected to receive but found themselves unable to do anything with the ball and kicked on fourth down. Elgin didn't have any better luck than did the Mustangs and the second half ended in a 0 to 0 tie.

Elgin opened the second half with a new spirit and in seven plays sent Bob Showers over from the one yard line for the first score. The extra point was made by Trumpus.

Within minutes Trumpus again went over the line from the two yard line and followed his scoring by adding the extra point. Again in the same quarter Tom Hunt found pay dirt from the eight to put Elgin safely out in front.

In the fourth period Heppner came up with its first and only touchdown, going 61 yards in 10 plays with Tom Driscoll going over from the two. The Mustangs failed to add the extra point. Elgin soon came up with another TD when Bob Showers again went into pay dirt from about the 10 yard line. Trumpus added the extra point.

Elgin had a total of 392 yards and 16 first downs to Heppner's 126 yards and 8 first downs.

Rangeland Seeder Developed by OSC For Rancher Use

A new rangeland seeder, Desert Flower IV, has been built by the Oregon State College agricultural engineering department for use in seeding ranges of eastern Oregon.

The 12-row, 14-foot-wide machine will seed up to 50 acres a day under good conditions.

An earlier experimental rangeland seeder, first field tested in 1958, has proved highly successful. It not only has greatly speeded the seeding of sagebrush-bunchgrass ranges, but grass survival and yields from lands seeded have been significantly increased. The new machine is larger with several improvements.

Dean E. Booster, OSC agricultural engineer, designed the machine in cooperation with N D Hyder and F A Sneya, range conservationists at the college's Squaw Butte-Harney experiment station, located 45 miles west of Burns.

The Desert Flower will be kept at the Squaw Butte-Harney branch station and will be loaned for seeding programs to ranchers and government agencies. It currently is on loan to the Lakeview district of the Bureau of Land Management for a special one-month project of seeding a burned over range area between Burns and Lakeview. Following that, it will go to the branch station.

Ridges on each of the seeder's 12 wheels make the seed furrows and drags on the back of the machine cover the seed. Each wheel is individually suspended so ground contour can be followed. Seed tubes are made of close wound coil springs and snap back into position when deflected by rocks or brush.

The tongue on the machine is hinged and can be folded back when the machine is hauled on a flatbed truck. The Desert Flower IV weighs about 5,000 pounds. The earlier experimental seeder was an 8-row, 3,000 pound machine. Two earlier models were small machines used to make design tests and try out various seeder attachments.

Pork Rated Top Buy This Month

Plan to use plenty of pork and add pork to the freezer this month and next. More pork, at lower prices, will be featured in local stores than shoppers have seen in the last 10 years.

Zelma Reigle, Oregon State College food marketing specialist, reports that about 12 percent more pork is expected on markets this September than last.

Look for good buys in pork shoulder steaks, chops, and roasts, Miss Reigle continues. Recommended freezing storage for pork is four to five months.

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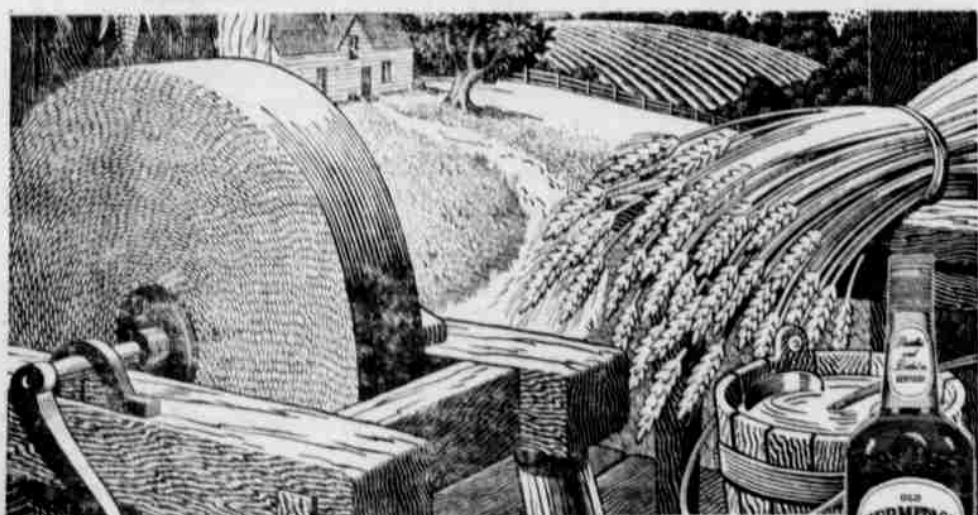
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
