Incorporated Farms On Increase; OSC Reviews Advantages

Incorporating the family farm is becoming more popular in Oregon as an efficient way to gain possible operating advantages and simplify dividing ownership among family members. Grant Blanch, Oregon State College agricultural economist, reports.

Corporations have certain financial advantages—such as limited liability—for the family farmer, he noted in the latest issue of the OSC agricultural experiment station's research magazine, "Oregon's Agricultural Progress." He says incorporating is often practical when you own considerable property which is not part of the farm or ranch.

More than 100 Oregon farmers and ranchers have incorporated. The trend is increasing, for nearly 25 percent of these incorporated farm-ranch businesses were formed during the last 2½ years.

The operation needn't be a big one to make incorporation a good idea, Blanch emphasized. Twenty-eight percent of the farms and ranches incorporated in Oregon had authorized capital stock of \$10,000 or less, and 21 percent from \$10,000 to \$25,000. About one-third had \$100,000 or more.

Even though incorporated, the farm usually is still owned and operated by the same people, for in farm-ranch corporations various members of the farm family are stockholders, board of directors, officers and employees.

Blanch suggests that when two or more people own the farm or ranch they may find incorporation an efficient way to divide ownership. Incorporation also is a desirable way to transfer ownership to other family members upon death of the principal stockholders.

The OSC economist stressed importance of good legal advice to determine advantages or disadvantages of incorporating for your own situation.

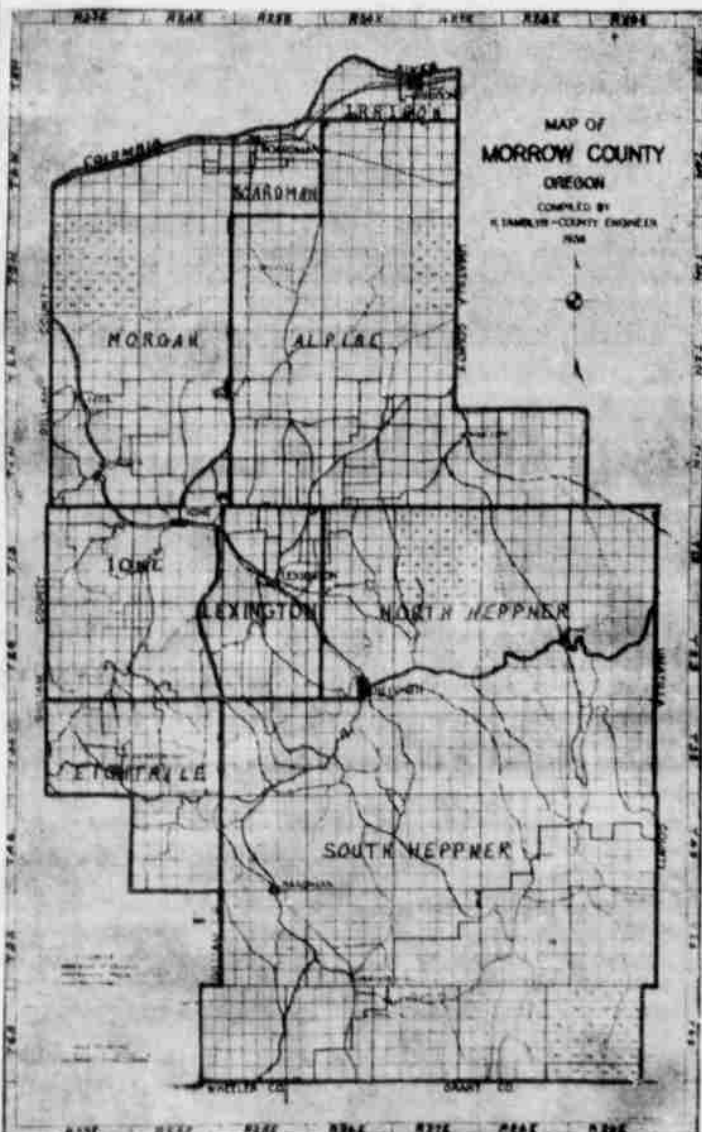
