County Agent's News
 (Continued from Page 2) are keeping a file of year books for reference, it is suggested that you write for yours now. Congressmen have a limited number of free copies or they are available at \$2.50 from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, 25, D. C. Our office copy is available for reference.

With the ever increasing threat throughout the state from starlings, information concerning startling activities and concentrations in various parts of Oregon are now being gathered by the Fish and Wildlife Service. Flocks of starlings caused a considerable damage in some areas of the state during the winter and spring of 1958-59. They have been reported seen in ever increasing flocks in this area. It would be helpful to this office if those who have observed starlings would call this office to present information which is necessary to make this survey complete.

Legislation enacted during the last legislature provided for an Oregon beef council. Such a council was activated on October 1st. Members appointed to the council by Governor Hatfield from recommendations made by the various livestock associations and livestock interests throughout the state were Jidge Tibbet, Enterprise; Mrs Kent Magruder, Clatskanie and Ted Hyde, Bly, cattlemen representatives; Otto Schild, Tillamook and Dick Westberg, Ashland, dairymen; Jack Wilson, North Powder feeder and Leland Jacobsmullen, Cornelius processor. The purpose of the beef council is to provide Oregon cattlemen and dairymen with an organization to which they can support the national livestock and meat board, the national beef council and their own state beef promotion programs. The council will be financed by voluntary contributions of 10 cents per head from producers on cattle brand inspected, to be collected by brand inspectors at the same time and place as brand inspection fees. When cattle are inspected at auction markets, the producer or his agent will be asked at the unloading chute whether the beef council deduction is authorized or is not authorized. The same procedure will apply to slaughter points. In cases where producers feel that a deduction for the beef council was made in error without their expressed approval, then within 90 days a refund may be applied for from the council on a form which will be made available to all brand inspectors.

At it's first meeting in Salem on October 1, the council felt that collections should not be started until all producers and handlers had an opportunity to learn more about the purpose of the beef council and the proposed methods of collection. A target date of November 1 for the start of collections is indicated. The council will attempt to send a representative to any group meeting in the area to further explain the programs so that everyone might be informed.

1959 wheat production in the Pacific Northwest area (Oregon, Washington and northern Idaho) was estimated at 109.9 million bushels, of which 97.2 million bushels were winter wheat and 12.7 million spring wheat. This may be compared with the 1958 crop of 110.8 million bushels of all wheat for this area; there being 103.3 million bushels of winter and 7.5 million spring wheat in this total. Estimated 1959 wheat yields for Oregon was 32.5 bushels for winter wheat, 30 bushels for spring. This compared to 35 and 27.5 bushels for 1958.
