Mrs. Fred Murtishaw, Irrigon, will act as assistant leader with Miss Ann Schmeder as junior leader.

Mrs Larry Schaad will supervise the activity of the high school group as soon as they organize.

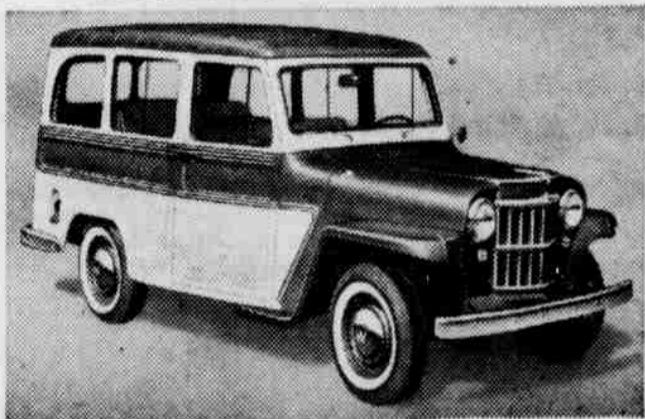

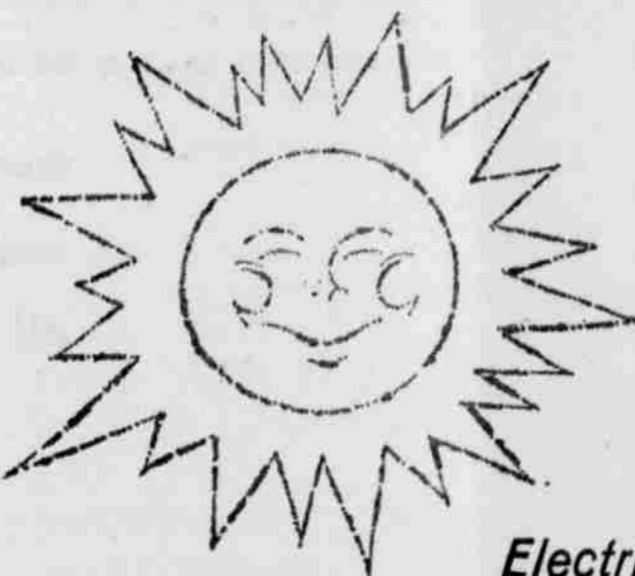
