

# Heppner Adds Moro To Collection of Scalps

Sherman high of Moro traveled to Heppner last Friday night only to fall before the Mustang gridders 21 to 12.

Co-captains Tom Driscoll and Dennis Doherty lost the toss of the coin and Heppner had to Kick off to the Huskies who in five plays had to give up the ball. Taking control on the Moro 45 yard line, Heppner took seven plays to get their first score with Driscoll going around right end for seven yards to score. Tom Green was credited with laying a key block. Neal Penland went off tackle to add the extra point.

Moro struck right back, marching 63 yards in nine plays with Terry Caseberg going over from the one. The extra point was missed.

On the first play of the second quarter Moro went back into deep punt formation but fumbled and Doherty picked up the ball and scooted 37 yards for another Heppner score. The PAT failed. At halftime Heppner lead 13-6.

In the third period Moro went 67 yards in six plays to score with quarterback Jim Duncan going over the one yard line. They again missed the extra point.

Heppner's defense then tightened up and shortly afterwards with the Huskies on their own

five yard line, Caseberg went back to pass only to have Dan Brosnan and Marion Biddle hit him in the end zone to give the Mustangs another two points on the scoreboard.

Heppner added another score when Caseberg passed from his own one-yard line, only to have Larry Tibbles intercept it and fall across the goal line. Again the Mustangs missed the point.

Heppner's ground and passing game netted them a total of 229 yards to 153 for the Huskies. Moro was held to a total of only 43 yards net gain in the second half. Heppner led in first downs 10 to 9.

This weekend the Mustangs go to Maupin to take on the Redskins and the team that wins this one will be settled on top of the Cayuse conference pile. Both Heppner and Maupin are now tied with 4 wins and no losses.

The Maupin game will be at 8 p. m.

## Children's Clothes Workshop Slated

Women in the Irrigon and Boardman area interested in learning how to sew children's clothing will be given an opportunity to do so by attending a children's play clothes workshop at the Irrigon Grange hall on November 2, 9, and 16—beginning at 10:30 A. Techniques in children's blouses and shirts will also be taught.

## Penney Store to Offer New Charge Account Service

D. M. Whitesmith announced today that his Heppner store has been selected as one of 410 additional Penney stores which will have customer charge accounts in 1960. This new customer service is expected to start here during the month of May 1960.

The store manager said the credit plan will be the newest type of charge account, called the Planned Payment Account. This is a 30-day charge account which makes it possible for a customer to pay her account in full within 30 days of billing date without a service charge. This plan also provides an option for customers who wish to spread payments over a longer period. Each month a bill is received the customer can pay it in full, without service charge, or if desired pay a designated minimum amount and extend the balance over a longer period. A service charge of 1 1/4 per cent is added to the balance after payment is credited. Minimum amounts vary from 1/4 to 1 1/8 of the total bill.

The Penney Time Payment Account is designed for higher priced apparel with a unit price of at least \$49. For these accounts the minimum payment will be \$10 per month and the account may extend to a maximum of 10 months. Home furnishings items with a minimum unit price of \$30 may also be purchased on a Time Payment Account. For these accounts minimum payments will be \$5 and accounts may run to a maximum of 18 months.

Mr Whitesmith emphasized that the credit plan will in no way change the Company's longstanding, low mark-up policy for customers who wish to continue to make their purchases on a cash-and-carry basis.

The number of Penney stores offering charge accounts in 1960 will total 600.

## First National Notes Business Gain

The First National Bank of Oregon recorded an impressive \$55 million gain in deposits during the past year, establishing a new autumn mark, it was reported by C. B. Stephenson, president, in response to a call for statements of condition by the comptroller of the currency.

Total deposits of \$856,308,346 were reported, which topped the previous autumn record of \$800,948,841 set on September 24, 1958. The bank notched a gain of \$15,504,200 over the June 6 call, which was a new record for that period.

Loans for the 80 First National offices amounted to \$481,417,949, an increase of \$76,198,004 over a year ago and also a new autumn record. Loans have increased \$18,482,502 since the June statement was published.

The Heppner branch of First National reported October 6 deposits of \$5,610,317 and loans totaling \$4,186,637, according to J. H. Bedford, manager.

At the same time he released comparable totals for the branch for the September 24, 1958 call for bank statements. On that date, deposits were \$5,696,790 and loans were \$3,269,624.

"Good business and record employment are reflected in the greatly increased bank deposits," C. B. Stephenson, president of First National said. "The people of Oregon have been more active in the Centennial year, putting more into savings, and business has been flourishing, creating bigger bank balances to carry on our growing business," he indicated.

"The rise in retail trade has been accompanied by a rise in consumer credit and the bank's activity in the financing of Oregon's huge heavy construction and home programs," the bank president stated.

## Local Directors To Attend State Conservation Meet

Farmer supervisors of the Heppner soil conservation district in Morrow county who attend the 11th annual meeting of their state-wide organization in Salem, Nov 4, 5, 6, will join in discussion of some of Oregon's pressing soil and water problems.

Raymond French, chairman of the Heppner district governing board, said that one of the questions supervisors would tackle at sessions of the Oregon Association of Soil Conservation Districts was the problem of increasing growth on low-producing pasture and range lands over the state.

He explained, "Some district cooperators are getting top returns from their forage-growing operations by using time-tested soil conservation practices. Others report pasture and range feed is scarce and supervisors hope to come up with the answer. "Our association is made up of supervisors from 57 SCD's who serve voluntarily and provide farmers and ranchers with technical and other forms of assistance in working out soil and water problems.

"We like our annual meeting because it helps solve our problems through an interchange of ideas and discussion with other supervisors and specialists in many agricultural fields."

French said the state-wide conservation public speaking contest for high school students is arousing a lot of interest in the Salem gathering. Under the theme "Grass Management," competition for first place in the seven soil conservation district areas is now going on. Area winners will compete in the finals at Salem.

Key speakers at the Salem meeting will be Gov Mark Hatfield, and Donald A. Williams, administrator, U. S. Soil Conservation Service, Washington, D. C.

SCD's throughout the state are again joining in providing foods and entrees for the meeting's Snack Bar, a popular feature each year. Supervisors of the Heppner district board who plan to take in the Salem meeting include: Raymond French, Heppner; Raymond Lundell, Ione, and John Wightman, Heppner.

## Beef Body Delays Dime Collections Until December 1

The new Oregon Beef Council has delayed start of collections of voluntary contributions for its support until December 1.

The seven-member council announced the one-month delay following its second meeting, held in Salem on October 15.

Ted Hyde of Bly, chairman, said the council does not want to start collections until it feels cattle owners throughout Oregon are familiar with the new program, which was authorized by the 1959 legislature.

In the interim, the council members will carry information to all county and state and farm associations it can reach before December 1. All auction markets, one of the points of collections, will also be reached to explain the program and seek full cooperation.

The council activity in promoting Oregon beef will be supported by 10-cent contributions authorized by cattle owners as animals go through any brand inspection points in the state.

Studies to set up a budget for the council will start immediately under a committee composed of J. H. Tippet, Enterprise; Leland Jacobsmuhlen, Cornelius; and Otto Schild, Tillamook. This committee will make its preliminary report at the next meeting, to be held at the Multnomah Hotel in Portland Thursday, November 12, starting at 10 a. m.
