New! Continental Pancake



The new Continental Pancake creates an aura of Old World glamour! It comes to the table puffed up with pride under a crown of cranberries or apple sauce. Continental Pancake

1 tablespoon shortening
3 eggs
1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup milk
Butter
Lemon juice
Honey or sugar
Confectioners' sugar
Cranberry or apple sauce

Place fat in deep skillet (10 to 12-inch diameter), and place in oven while ingredients are being mixed and oven preheated to 450°F. Beat eggs until light. Blend flour, sugar, salt; add to egg mixture; add milk. Beat until smooth. Remove skillet from oven, spread shortening to grease bottom. Pour in all batter. Bake 15 minutes (until pancake is puffy, well-risen, brown). Dot surface with butter. Sprinkle with lemon juice and honey or sugar. Roll, or fold from opposite sides to center, making three layers. Turn out on warm platter. Garnish with fruit. Dust with confectioners' sugar. Serve promptly. Makes 1 or 2 servings.
