Australian War Bride 4-H Leader

A little foreign flavor will surely be added to the newly organized "Needle and Thread 4-H club of Irrigon by their leader, Mrs Charles Early, an Australian war bride, according to Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agent.

Officers of the first year clothing club include: Barbara Aldrich, president; Joyce Jackson, vice president; Patsy Davis, secretary; Peggy Henderson, news reporter, and Marla Robertson, song leader.

Mrs Early, a World War II bride, was born in Sydney, Australia where she received her elementary and high school training. Her father was a British government employee who supervised dredging work done in rivers and streams.

"We were most proud of my father," commented this effervescent Irrigon homemaker "when he received the imperial service medal from the British crown. The occasion had all the pomp and ceremony for which the English are known."

During World War II June Early volunteered her services to the U S O in Sydney and came to the United States as a war bride in 1944.

"My two daughters—Lynda, 8 and Leslie Anne, 5, are both American born", says Mrs Early with pride, "and I got my citizenship papers in 1951, so we're all one American family."

The Early's came to Irrigon in 1952 where they purchased a small irrigated farm. Charles, her husband, supplements the farming income by working with the Hogdonson Construction Company. The Early's had a tragic fire in 1958 when their house burned down destroying all their possessions. They were away at the time and nothing was saved.

The Irrigon community arranged a shower for the family to meet their immediate needs. Within a year's time a new house has been built and the Early's are gradually recovering from their loss.

Plans are being eagerly made by Mrs Early, and Mrs Roy Davis (leader with six years of club experience) to make the first year clothing interesting and educational for the nine "Just So Girls" in their club.

Other members in the club besides the officers include Darlene Gollyhorn, Jerry Swearington, Yvonne Benty, and Sheila Young.

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Venison Jerky Still Popular

Venison jerky, a favorite food of both Indians and whites in early Oregon trail days is still popular, according to Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agent. Oregon State College home economists and fish and game experts suggest these two recipes for making it.

Simplest way to make jerky is in the oven. However, the oven cooks the meat slightly and old timers feel it does not impart the old-timed smoked flavor.

Traditional jerky is preserved entirely by drying in a smoke-house. New electric smokers now on the market make it possible to smoke jerky and other meats at home any season of the year, the specialists point out.

Oven Method-Jerky
3 pounds venison or beef
Salt to taste
1/2 teaspoon liquid smoke (more or less desired)
Pepper to taste

Remove all fat from the meat and slice it very thin. Sometimes local meat shops will do this on electric slicers.

Generously salt meat, add a dab of liquid smoke to one side before salting. Place the strips layer upon layer in a large crock or bowl, and lightly pepper each layer as stacked. Allow to stand at least six hours or overnight.

To dry, remove oven racks and stretch strips of meat across racks, allowing pieces of meat to touch but not overlap. Be sure to allow enough uncovered space on racks for good oven circulation. Place the racks back into the oven so that the upper rack is at least 4 inches from the top of the oven and the lower one at least 4 inches from the bottom. Set the oven temperature at 150, and dry meat for about 11 hours. Meat left in the oven overnight, from 9 P M to 8 A M should be dry.

Cut lean venison into convenient pieces about 1 to 1 1/2 inches thick, and 4 to 6 inches long. More tender cuts make better jerky, but any cuts can be used. Loin, round and flank are recommended.

Prepare a brine of 1 1/2 pounds salt to a gallon of water in a granite or stone crock. Add meat. Weight with a plate or polyethylene so that all pieces are under the brine. Allow to stand at least 12 hours.

Drain well, place on trays in shaker. Dry and flavor with

warm, not hot, smoke for 5 to 15 days, depending on size of pieces to be dried. When completely dry, the meat is ready to use or store.
Stored in airtight containers, jerky should keep indefinitely.
