Ronny Jones, the new president, presided over the two meetings of the Hoof and Horn club which was held at the home of Marcel Jones.

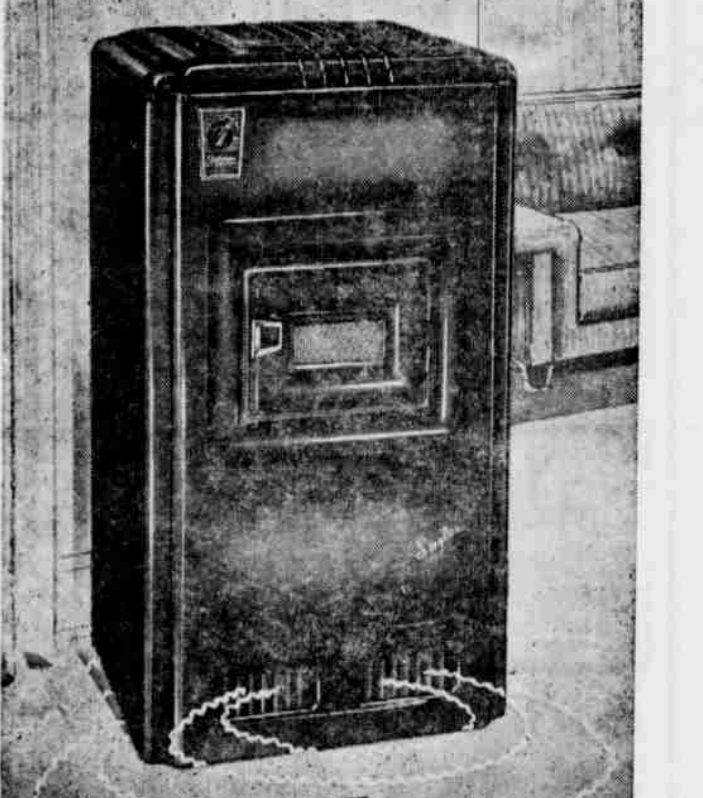
