

Mustangs End Season With 35 to 19 Win Over Echo Cougars

The galloping Mustangs of Heppner high ended their 1959 grid season Friday night by walloping the Echo Cougars 35 to 19. They wound up the season with a record of five wins and four losses.

Friday was homecoming for the school and during half-time at the game co-captains crowned Carol K Anderson homecoming queen. With her were her princesses Roseann Ayers, Leonore Leonig, Lydia Van Houte and Fern Albert. Dr L D Tibbles and Albert Connor were honored by the team and presented with certificates of appreciation by the two captains for their work at home games and many of the other games.

Tom Driscoll and company led Heppner to its victory with Driscoll racking up 19 of Heppner's points. The first time Heppner got their hands on the ball, Driscoll swept wide around right end and scampered 45 yards for the TD. He also made the extra point.

Later in the first period Neal Penland got loose on a 40 yard scoop for six points, going off tackle. Dennis Doherty made the conversion.

Midway through the second quarter Driscoll again got loose when he took a pass from Doherty and went 35 yards for the score. Penland went off tackle for the extra point. On the second play of the third quarter, Driscoll went off guard for 70 yards and another score and Penland added the extra point.

Echo got its first score in the same period when Billy Doherty went wide around end for eight yards and the score. The extra point was added. In the fourth period Echo came through with two more scores, the first coming when Hooker threw a pass to Tefft who went 60 for the score. The PAT failed. They again scored when Doherty went over from the 2.

Heppner wound things up when Dan Brosnan went wide around end from the 2 yard line and Larry Tibbles passed to Tom Green for the extra point.

The Mustangs will lose six

seniors from the squad for next year. They are Tom Driscoll, co-captain and halfback; Dennis Doherty, co-captain and quarter; Tom Howell, center; Al Osmin, tackle; Bob Davidson, guard; and Mickey Van Scholack, fullback.

Two Other Diseases To be Included In March of Dimes

The Annual fund raising appeal of The National Foundation will be known in January, 1960, as the "New" March of Dimes, in keeping with the expanded program of the organization which now includes birth defects and arthritis as well as polio, Gene Pierce, Morrow County March of Dimes leader, announced this week.

The word "New" was added to call attention to the fact that March of Dimes funds are now behind the fight against two more crippling diseases, Mr Pierce said.

Along with the new program areas, a big share of the 1960 New March of Dimes funds will continue to be used in polio work, both caring for patients and continuing research into aspects of the disease that are still unknown. Although the Salk vaccine has been available for four years, polio still remains a major concern because of patients stricken in earlier years and because millions of people still have not been vaccinated, he said.

"There still are 50,000 polio patients receiving assistance from The National Foundation's chapters, and there will be more polio cases in 1960 because of failure to take the vaccine. Aid to polio patients will require millions of dollars in the coming year."

Mr Pierce disclosed the startling fact that almost as many newborn babies die of birth defects each year as the total number of people killed in traffic accidents.

"Statistics show that while approximately 38,000 people die in traffic accidents each year, 34,000 infants are either stillborn or live less than one month as a result of birth defects. The whole nation is making a great effort to reduce the traffic accident toll, but most people are unaware of the tragic human loss due to birth defects."

"That The National Foundation is now tackling this dreadful affliction is great good fortune for all parents and children."

The coordinated attack on the causes and treatment of arthritis is moving ahead steadily, he said. Even now, the many techniques that physicians and therapists have learned from the treatment and rehabilitation work with polio patients are being applied to help youthful arthritis patients reach adulthood as free as possible from crippling and deformity.

A search is on throughout Oregon to find the state's three outstanding young men of 1959 in a program to be inaugurated by the Oregon Junior Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the First National Bank of Oregon.

State Farm Prices Mark Oct Gains; U S Average Down

Oregon farm prices showed a mixed pattern of ups and downs in October and ended up with an average 2 percent higher than a month ago, reports Mrs Elvira Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State College.

At the same time, reports from the U S department of agriculture show prices received by farmers over the nation dropped seasonally in October to a point 2 percent lower than last month and the lowest in nearly 2 years. National farm prices now stand 6 percent below last year and the lowest since November 1957.

In Oregon, October egg and turkey prices moved up, and milk and milk cows also carried higher price tags. Feed grains and wheat climbed, and hay and potato prices also rose.

These gains in state farm prices were partially offset by lower prices on most meat animals and wool, broiler prices dropped for the second straight month, and corn prices turned lower. However, gains averaged more than losses for the state's farmers and total farm prices averaged 2 percent higher than in September and 4 percent above a year ago.

Meanwhile, prices received by U S farmers fell to the lowest average in nearly two years. Cattle, hogs, corn, grapefruit, calves, and eggs all moved down. Higher prices on milk, fresh tomatoes, and wheat only partially offset the decline.

Prices the nation's farmers pay for goods and services also moved lower in October, but at a much slower rate, Mrs Horrell found. Farm wage rates were down, as were prices paid for farm production items. However, higher prices paid for things used in farm-family living offset these lower costs to some extent.

With prices received by farmers dropping faster than prices paid by farmers, the purchasing power of farm products slipped a little last month. The parity ratio—the government's yardstick for measuring the relationship between prices received and prices paid by farmers—fell to one point below September this year, 6 points below October 1958, and the lowest since August 1940.
