For those who wish to make the companion picture, the copper may be purchased at the

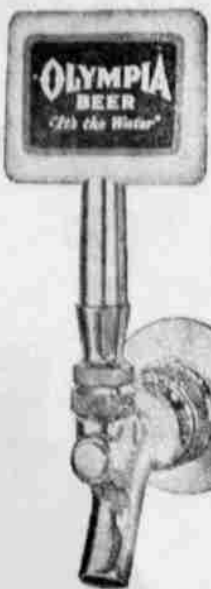

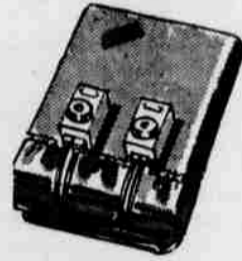
