Chats With Your Home Agent

Mrs Roberta Frasier, family life specialist, was recently added to the Oregon State College extension staff. From the several contacts I have had with her since she came to Corvallis I'd say Washington's loss is surely Oregon's gain. (Mrs Frasier comes from Washington State University).

The following is a recent news release from Mrs Frasier which I think you will find informative:

A give-and-take feeling of love and affection between mothers and their children is one of the main satisfactions mothers say they get from rearing their families, according to Mrs Roberta Frasier, Oregon State College extension specialist. Mrs Frasier reports a recent U S Dept of agriculture survey of 11,500 homemakers in 15 states. Regardless of where they lived, ages, or number of children in the home, mothers reported greatest pleasure came from giving and receiving love from their children, in sharing experiences, in feeling needed by someone, and getting a sense of fulfillment of their "main role" in life.

A third of the mothers found satisfaction in children who had "good" traits—honesty, good grades, good health, and habits of neatness and cleanliness. Mothers also were pleased to see their children take part in community activities.

Although they frequently complain of cooking, clean-up, and the constant care required by the family, a third of the mothers listed feeding, clothing, and looking after family needs as one of the rewards of being a mother, Mrs Frasier says.

Mothers reported some puzzling moments, too. More than half of them wanted help in disciplining and handling social relationships between youngsters. Some of the mothers felt

"at a loss" in handling children when they were indifferent, moody, and angry. Most mothers said they wanted to learn more about what to expect in individual differences between children.

Mothers rated disobedience as the number one discipline problem, followed by showing off in front of guests, bad manners, untidiness, resisting advice, arguing, talking back, shirking home responsibilities, wanting too much freedom, dishonesty, and disagreement over allowances. Teasing and fighting among brothers and sisters, jealousy, selfishness among children, and lack of interest in what goes on about them, were listed as "concerns" by mothers.

Purpose of the study was to collect information that would be helpful in setting up extension education programs throughout the country.
