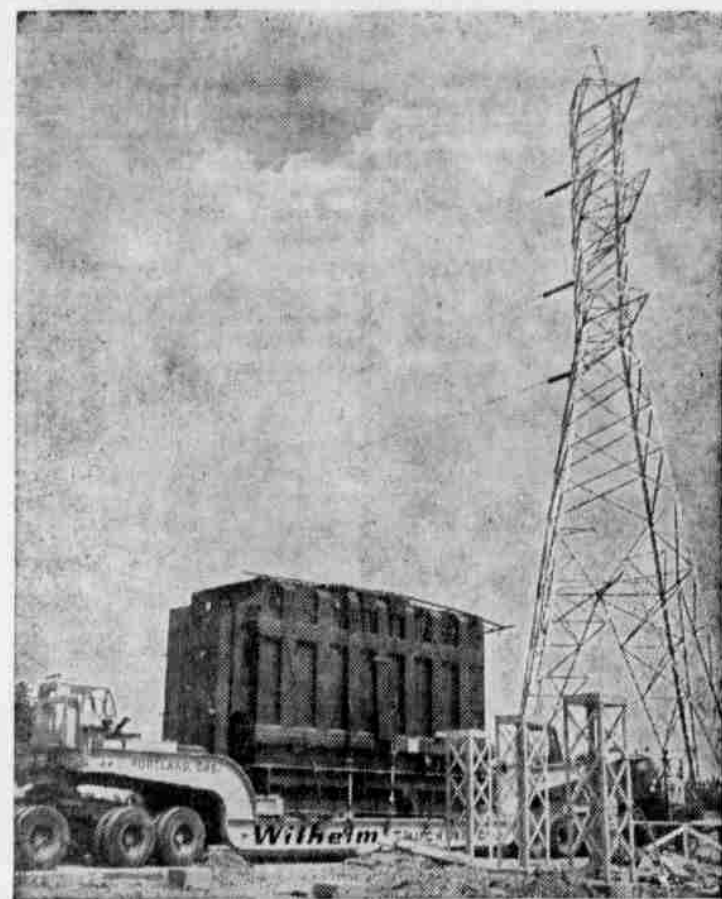




PP&L READIES POWER GIANTS—Massive bulk of the largest power transformer of its type in the Northwest and the soaring steel terminal tower for Pacific Power & Light Company's newest 230,000-volt installation in Oregon achieve dramatic emphasis for PP&L's record system expansion. Lines will bring new power supplies into Oregon system.

PP&L Completes Power Facilities For Oregon Areas

Major transmission lines and substations built by Pacific Power & Light Company for the delivery of new power supplies into Oregon have been placed in service in time to supply the peak winter-month electric needs of the company's customers, it was reported Wednesday.

PP&L President Don R. McClung reported that the completion of the 230,000-volt and 115,000-volt transmission circuits and the large-capacity substations wound up a record one-year system-wide expansion of facilities.

Coupled with hydroelectric projects completed by PP&L in the past year and large blocks of power reserved for the company from new powerhouses of other utilities, McClung said, the company's multi-million dollar investments in facilities during the 1959 construction program will provide ample power to serve the growing electric loads of customers through the next five years.

The company's power development program includes engineering studies looking toward the supply of loads far beyond that period, he added.

The Pacific Power official said the key transmission lines also will provide emergency alternate routes for power delivery to PP&L's Oregon districts.

Among the largest projects in the year's program was a 230,000-volt capacity line built to bring the power output of the 268,000-kilowatt Swift hydroelectric development into the company's system at Portland. Another is a spectacular three-mile overhead crossing of the Columbia River to bring new power into Oregon from the expanded Merwin powerhouse. Two of the seven towers are 485 feet high.
