

Sherman and Ione Take Measure of Heppner Hoopsters

Coach Clint Agee's Mustangs opened the 1959-60 basketball season last Friday night on the home court against Sherman high of Moro and came out on the bottom with a 45-38 score.

Heppner never could manage to catch up with the Huskies—at the end of the first quarter Heppner was behind 13-9. The Huskies had five points before Heppner managed to get any. By the end of the half, Moro had extended its lead to 24 to 18.

In the third quarter the Mustangs only managed to get eight points, but in the final period they managed to come back with 12, but still short of enough to catch up with the Huskies.

Tom Driscoll led Heppner with 9 points and Terry Kaseberg led Moro scoring with 13. Tuesday night Heppner tangled with the Ione Cardinals on the home floor and again came out on the short end of the score, 63-42.

The Mustangs had a rough time in the first quarter, coming up with only one point to Ione's 12. In the second quarter Heppner outscored the Cardinals 15 to 8 to bring the score closer, 16 to 20. Early in the third period Heppner went ahead of Ione for a minute, then dropped back to stay behind the rest of the game. In the third, Heppner got 19 points to Ione's 16.

special consultant for the department under a three month contract calling for him to make a study of the state's industrial development potential.

PIN BALL GAMES WIN

The Oregon Supreme Court's decision Wednesday legalizing so-called free play pin ball machines, in effect places the question of their desirability in this state "squarely up to the Legislature," Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said Monday. In a statement warning of possible renewal of attempts to organize a pinball racket in Oregon, Thornton said: "The danger of free-play machines does not appear at first blush. On the surface they appear to be harmless, innocent amusement devices. Investigation, however, will show under-the-counter payoffs to the players, thereby constituting a gambling evil of serious proportions. Gambling losses to a heavy player can run into hundreds of dollars per month, as the recent disbarment of a prom-

inent attorney and former municipal judge who diverted several thousand dollars in public funds into the pinball slots has proven.

"Where the pinball machine has a recorded right-of-free-play (and most of them do), the re-pay meter which records in the machine the number of free plays run off, permits the owner of the premises to pay off in cash to the player, and the meter serves as a record of the owner's claim for payments from the pinball service company.

"By feeding additional coins into the machine the player can raise the odds to fantastical amounts."
