

All Boat Owners Subject to New Laws Starting January 1

The Oregon state marine board has announced that a synopsis of the new Oregon boating laws, which become effective January 1, 1960, is now available to the boating public. The synopsis and application forms for identifying boat number, annual boat license and certificate of title are available at the offices of county sheriffs, state motor vehicle field offices and the various boat dealers throughout the state which have been listed with the state marine board.

The new Oregon boating laws which are enacted by the last legislature, are in accordance with the federal boating act of 1958. The federal act delegates to the states the numbering of undocumented vessels and enforcement of boating laws.

On January 1, 1960, the U S Coast Guard will discontinue issuing boat numbers to Oregon boats and only those issued by the state marine board will be valid.

The Oregon laws emphasize "Safe Boating" and apply to all undocumented vessels 12 feet and longer and to those having motors of 10 horsepower or more, regardless of the size of the boat.

Household Workers May Be Covered by Social Security

If you do work in a private household and get paid \$4.00 a week or more, make sure that your employer reports your earnings and sends in the social security taxes every three months. Otherwise, you will lose the protection that social security provides to you and your family when you retire, die, or become disabled.

Your employer should deduct 2 1/4% from your wages if he paid you \$50.00 or more in a calendar quarter, stated Mr Vernon Welton, manager of the La Grande, social security office. The employer must match your tax with an equal amount and send the total of 5% of wages paid you to Internal Revenue (beginning with wages paid in 1960, the tax will be 3% for each). A simplified envelope-type "Tax Return", which is available from Internal Revenue Service is the easiest way for most employers to furnish the necessary information and to pay the social security tax. The report must show your name, social security account number, and amount of cash wages paid. These reports will serve as the basis for determining whether social security benefits will be payable to you and your dependents and the amount of monthly benefit rate. It is, therefore, very important for you, emphasized Mr Welton to check with your employer to see that the reports are prepared properly and are filed on time.

SUPREME COURT BACKLOG

Chief Justice William McAllister of the Oregon Court is of the opinion that the overload of cases that has challenged the court for several years, will be eliminated within 16 to 18 months.

By 1955 the backlog of unfinished cases had accumulated in the office of each justice to such an extent that decisions could not be expected for three or four years.

The 1959 Legislature authorized the high court to appoint temporary justices to enable it to reduce the heavy backlog of cases.

Chief Justice McAllister Wednesday announced that the high court had selected Circuit Judges George H. Duncan, Marion County and Paul R. Harris, Multnomah County to assist with the backlog problem. The new aids succeeded Circuit Judges Charles W. Redding, Portland and Dal M. King, Coquille. The court has been making heavy inroads on the backlog, both in the number of cases at issue, those awaiting oral argument, and in the waiting period for cases on the docket compared to a year ago.

While the pro tempore justices are sitting on the Supreme Court they will serve their circuit courts to help prevent delays in the lower courts.

WOULD HIKE SOLON'S PAY

Is the poor hunting and fishing season accountable for the current ambition of state Interim committees and commissions?

The State Civil Service Commission has just issued a young tome surveying salaries paid to all state officials and employees and listing comparable pay by industry and pay scales in adjoining states—with comment that if state legislators don't get more money (meaning salary) the Legislature may attract only the wealthy, retired or those subsidized by a firm or organization.

Each Oregon legislator gets \$600 a year. The people will vote next year on whether to increase this to \$2,100. The commission said that many legislators refuse to run for a second term after serving one term. The Supreme Court is considering the constitutionality of the \$2,100 boost.

Further training of high school and college teachers in science, mathematics and engineering has been arranged for 12 or more weeks next summer at Oregon State College, Reed College and the University of Oregon.

Tuition and fees will be paid to the teachers, who will receive stipends of \$75 a week for duration of the institute, plus allowance for travel and dependents.

The National Science Foundation is sponsoring the program expected to last a maximum of 12 weeks.

DRUNKEN DRIVER LAW

"A simple money fine does not prove a deterrent to drunk drivers but a mandatory jail sentence would," Polk County District Atty Walter Foster told members of the Interim Legislative Highway Committee Wednesday.

Committee members were anxious to get the cooperation of state bar members to support the new legislation. Rep Beulah Hand (D Clackamas) who called for the bills declared "They should be tough—the toughest we can have drafted."

TO THE EDITOR . . .

To The Editor:
About that old two-story building on East Main street, owned by Charles Vaughn. You said it was not known just when it was built. Here is the story of that old building.

Before the flood of 1903, my father, J L Yeager, pioneer furniture dealer, owned and operated his furniture store on that lot, in an old dilapidated one-story wooden shack. It was washed away in the great flood of 1903. Father had also formerly had his store in the brick building on W Main St where Ed Gonty had his shoe store, and Gilliam and Bisbee's store was just south where the bakery store is or was.

After the flood, I went out to work in the harvest fields for Bill Stafford and when about half through, my mother told me that they were going to build a new store where the old one used to be. She said my father wanted me to come home and help him erect their new building, which I did. My father never left the ground, so I had charge of the most of the building of that old building. So, it was built in the fall of 1903, the year of the flood. No one ever occupied that building but my father, then when he retired, he leased or rented it to Charley Vaughn for \$8.00 a month, and Charley has been there ever since. My father told me that Charley had never missed one payment.

When my father died, the building became the property of my sister, Mrs B H Beck, and my brother, Ralph Yeager. They later sold it to Charles Vaughn. I hate to see the old landmarks torn down. I wish some one with a camera would snap a picture of the old building and send it to me. I would appreciate that very much.
