Help For The New Homemaker



Many young women start housekeeping in small quarters. Because of the fact that many young people are getting married right out of school, income often is inadequate to start them off in a well equipped modern home. As a result, the young homemaker may find that her first home will not have sufficient storage space, especially when it comes to the storage of dishes and glassware.

When space is at a premium, inexpensive shelves can be utilized for storage of good dishes and glassware, provided the china and glasses are protected. The use of transparent saran film has made possible the use of such unusual storage places. Even spaces under the sink and on top shelves, which are not too accessible for every day use, can be utilized for vases, pitchers and items that are bulky and are used only occasionally.

Glasses may be wrapped in saran individually or covered in a group. All plates of the same size may be wrapped together. They are clearly visible because of the transparency of the wrap, yet protected from dust and greasy film.

Even though a young bride may have adequate storage space in her cupboards, the wrapping of seldom used pieces of china and glass with transparent film will save her time and effort.
