Mr Page was born in Svholk, England in 1879. He came to Grant county with his mother and sisters in 1898 and resided here until the last few years when he and Mrs Page moved to the coast for their health. He was married to Chloe M Newcomb in 1935.  
He is survived by his widow, two sisters, Mrs Ralph Gribble of Portland; and Mrs Glenn Hadley of Fossil, several nieces and nephews, among them are Bill Elder of Ontario, Frank and Joe Elder of Monument and Marge Elder Hughes of Pendleton. He also leaves a step daughter, Betsy of Vancouver, Wash and a step son who is with the Canadian government. Mr Page was a member of the Church of England.

### Former Governor To Seek National Committee Position

Elmo Smith, ex-governor of Oregon, announced today that he would be a candidate for Republican National Committeeman at the May primary election. The post is presently held by Robert Mautz, Portland attorney, who has announced he will not run for another term.  
Smith is publisher of the Albany daily Democrat-Herald and has newspaper interests at John Day and Madras in eastern Oregon. He has resided at Albany since leaving the office of governor in 1957.  
Prior to becoming governor Smith had served in the Oregon senate for four sessions. In 1955 he was president of the senate and stepped to the governorship from that position.  
Over many years he has been a major influence in the development of Oregon's modern highway system.  
The former governor regards himself as a middle-of-the-road Republican. "I continue to retain my interests in good government at all levels. Business commitments keep me pretty busy but I do have time to engage some in political activity."  
"I have been encouraged to

run for national committeeman by a number of long-time personal and political friends who share my interest in government responsibility."

"I shall continue efforts to keep the Republican party an instrument of good government dedicated to the welfare and advancement of all people," Smith stated in issuing his announcement. He added, "So many thousands of hard working Oregon Republicans have helped me in the past that I welcome any opportunity to help the party cause."

Smith, a veteran airplane pilot, is presently serving as a member of the state board of aeronautics on appointment by Governor Mark Hatfield. During the past year he has also served as a consultant on continuity of government for the western office of the Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization. He is a director of the Insurance Company of Oregon, and a director of the Oregon Pilots association.

The former governor first entered public service as a youth when he served three terms as mayor of Ontario, Oregon's easternmost city.
