### ANNUAL WEED MEETING HEARS OF PROGRESS IN COUNTY CONTROL

Medusa head rye and Dalmation head flax are two noxious weeds which threaten to be problems if farmers do not watch and eradicate them when small areas are found, warned Rex Warren, farm crops specialist from OSC, speaker at the annual weed control meeting held here recently.

He said the weeds are easily recognized and that Delapon is effective on Medusa head while Dalmation head flax can be controlled with most chemicals effective on broad leaf weeds.

Dean Swan, working on weed research at the Pendleton branch experiment station, said the annual weed control recommendations remain the same as reported last year. Tarweed, gives most wheat growers their biggest headaches, he said. He told of popular controls.

County judge Oscar Peterson reported on the county weed control program and stated that 250 miles of county roads were sprayed to control Russian thistle. Roadside grass seedings were also made during the year.

The group recommended that the county continue the same type of weed program directed by the county agent's office and having the weed advisory committee appointed in 1959 by the court.

Swan reported on morning glory control and told of methods for control.

County agent, N C Anderson reported on accomplishments during the past year and said a set of colored slides showing noxious weeds in the county are now available for those who would like to use them. He said 47 farmers participated in the ACP cost sharing weed control program.
