The annual Sweetheart dinner will be a no host affair this year at the Saddle Room of the

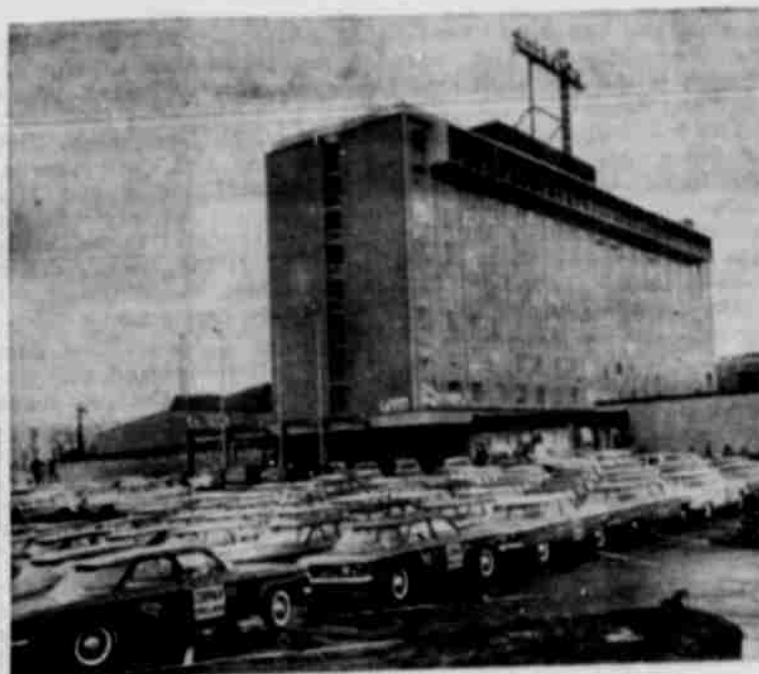

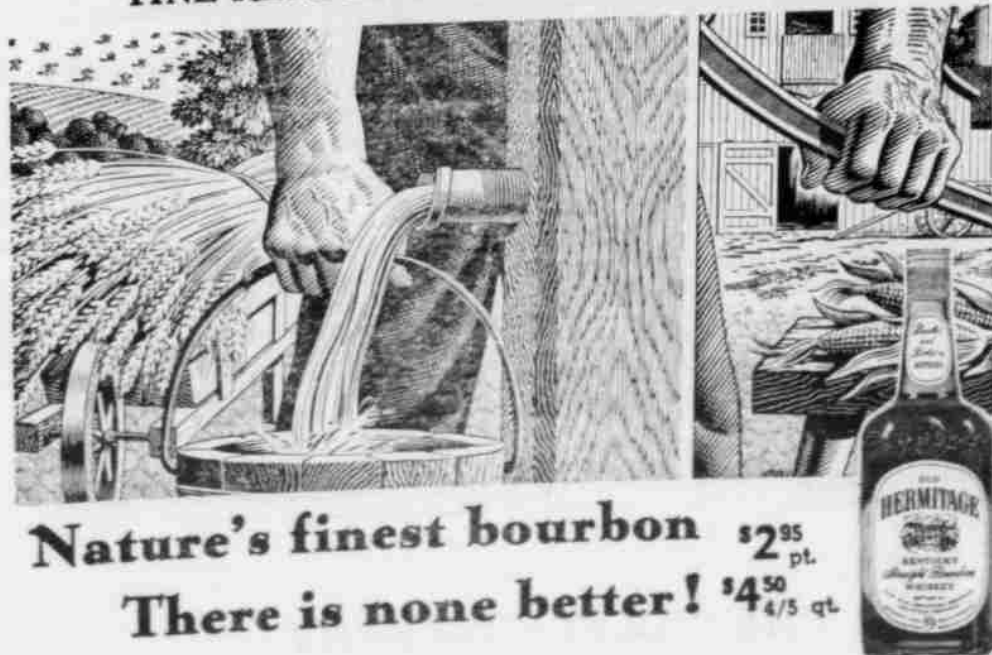
