Jet Booms Explained
Preceding the P-TA meeting, Captain Roy MacDonald of the 538th F I S, Larson Air Force Base, Moses Lake, Wash and pilot of the F104 jet plane gave a talk to a large group explaining the sonic boom. He told what the boom was, how it acted etc. He stated that jet operations are carried out at altitudes of 20,000 ft or above and that the normal high cruising speed of jet aircraft coupled with high altitude operations make it possible for an aircraft to be considerable distance away from the scene of the boom it creates. The Air Force is providing 24 hour a day, 365 days a year protection of the country.

Captain MacDonald was introduced by Mayor Charles O' Connor. He had on display a model 104 jet and explained all the parts. Also he had a pressurized suit, a helmet, gloves and spurs worn by the airman.
