Last weekend the Stanfield Tigers dumped the Ione Cardinals 49 to 21. This was the first league loss for the Ione team and this Saturday, if the Heppner team can beat the Cardinals there will be a two way tie for first place in the league between Heppner and Ione.

Condon Man to Seek Democratic Post

James O Burns, Condon businessman, has filed for delegate at large to the Democratic National Convention. Burns is secretary-treasurer and manager of Dunn Bros Inc, pioneer retail mercantile business that has been operating in the same family since 1893.

Burns was born in Condon and educated in local schools. He attended the University of Oregon. During World War II he served as a bombardier and was a prisoner of war. He is married and has one son.

He has been active in local politics, serving as chairman of the Gilliam county Democratic committee for the past 12 years. He is also county chairman of the Re-Elect Senator Neuberger committee.

Other positions he has held include: Mayor of Condon, 1953-54; exalted ruler, Condon Elks lodge, 1954-55; past commander of American Legion Post No 25 and V F W Post No 6096, and county fund drive chairman for the American Red Cross.

He is chairman of the Gilliam county high school advisory board, and vice-chairman of the Gilliam county school reorganization committee. Burns will support the winner of the Oregon primary. At present he is a supporter of Senator Kennedy.

County Savings Bond Sales Show Increase During January

According to a report received today by Jack Bedford, county Savings Bonds committee chairman, the month of January was one of the best in several years for sales of E and H Savings Bonds in the state. Sales of this county last month amounted to \$24,372. One year earlier they were \$12,084.

State sales last month totaled \$4,504,057. It was the highest volume in Oregon for a January since 1955.

Reports to the state office indicate that a good many Oregonians who have been long-time owners of series E or J Savings Bonds, or who have un-matured series F bonds, have availed themselves of the new privilege granted by the United States Treasury Department of transferring from these securities to series H bonds. Effective on January 1, 1960, this privilege is designed to enable people who own the accumulative type of series E, F, and J Savings Bonds to move from them into series H bonds, which pay interest by government check each six months. Mr Bedford pointed out that this transfer can be made without paying income tax on interest earned over a long period of years, until the H bonds themselves are cashed. The purpose is to make it possible for long time owners of Savings Bonds to move into a type of security which will give them current income.

Twenty-four counties showed increased sales in January over the corresponding month in 1959.

When they complete the eight weeks of instruction, they will go on to advanced infantry or specialist training.

FHA Farm House Construction Loans Now Available

Morrow county farmers may now construct or repair farm houses and service buildings with loans from the Farmers Home Administration.

Housing loans may be made only to farm owners. The farm must produce a substantial part of the operator's annual cash income and must be known as a farm in the community. Housing funds cannot be used to buy land or refinance debts.

Security will be a mortgage on the farm being improved. Maximum repayment terms are 33 years at four per cent interest.

Farmers buy their building materials wherever they please, usually from local dealers. They must provide building plans and estimates from a reliable source.

Periodic inspections during construction are made by the agency to assure that sound construction standards are followed.

FHA loans are provided only when private lenders cannot adequately serve the farm owner's credit needs. The agency does not compete with private lenders, but does supplement the credit services supplied by other sources.

Other loans available include farm ownership loans, soil and water loans, and farm operating loans.

Further information on the loans may be obtained at the county office of the Farmers Home Administration located at 105 S E Byers Avenue, Pendleton, on Monday of each week.
