

### IONE SUNDAY SCHOOL HEARS OF RESULTS OF ITS FOREIGN DONATIONS

Mrs Fredrick Martin of Ione received a letter from the Heifer Project Inc in Quito, Ecuador, South America thanking she and her class in the Ione Community church school. Mrs Martin was a teacher of the Intermediate Sunday school class in 1956 and they sent \$25 to the Heifer Project for baby chicks.

The letter said: Dear Donor: Please excuse the delay in writing but until recently Heifer Project hasn't had a representative in Ecuador. Heifer Project along with the people of Ecuador want to thank you wholeheartedly for your kind gift. The baby chicks you were so generous to donate are in the hands of the needy, worthy people all over Ecuador. These chicks

have brought smiles and food to thousands of people in this country along with greatly improving the quality of the poultry. The chicks went to agricultural schools, mission farms, needy farmers, Indians, etc. A good example of success of the chick donations would be that of Cuenca, a mountain of 50,000 inhabitants. The people of Cuenca had for years depended on weaving and exporting "Panama hats" to the U S. By 1954 many of the people were on the verge of starvation due to the fact that Japanese and Italian weaving machine techniques had so lowered the cost of weaving of hats, that the Ecuadorian hand methods just could no longer compete. The next year Heifer Project started mass shipments to Cuenca and in 4 year's time (today) the poultry business has definitely replaced the "Panama hats" business as the means of livelihood.

### Secrets of Rug Making Explained At Extension Meeting

"Rugmaking is not something you decide to do on the spur of the moment," stated Mrs Ewing Hynd, Cecil. "It takes about a year to gather the necessary materials before you can even think of beginning."

Mrs Hynd made this and many other comments on rugmaking when she met with a group of interested women in Morrow county at the Pine City school house on Monday, March 14, to give them preliminary instructions on hooked and braided rugs.

The meeting was sponsored by the Morrow county extension service, according to Esther Kirmis, county agent.

As a veteran rug maker, Mrs Hynd suggested that a beginner in the rug making business might start with a hooked rug first as less skill is needed to produce a rug in which an individual could take pride. She demonstrated an automatic hooked rug needle which puts the wool strips into the rug backing with machine gun precision.

The rug instructor explained that braided rugs take more technique and also knowledge of color and design to bring about a worthwhile floor covering. She demonstrated the technique of braiding with the use of braiders, the selections of colors and design, and gave the women information where they might obtain this equipment and materials.

"I'm a firm believer in using wool for all rugs," concluded Mrs Hynd, "I feel that the material you use in your rugs should surely be worth the time you spend in making a rug. It's just like purchasing a rug, you get what you pay for!"

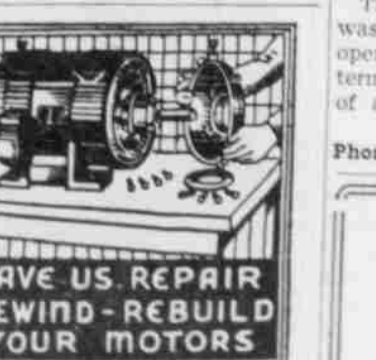
The women decided to spend the summer in securing materials and equipment and will meet again with Mrs Hynd in the fall to start their rugs.

### "The Morrrows" Tells County 4-H Story

"The Morrrows of Morrow County", a local 4-H story told in colored slides of county 4-H activities, is proving to be a good publicity aid for fostering 4-H work, according to Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agent.

With the celebration of National 4-H Club Week, March 5-12, the idea came to the county extension staff to show a typical 4-H family in Morrow county. Slides of 4-H activities in the county, taken over a number of years by N C Anderson, county agent, were put together and a story was woven around them.

"We call our 4-H family the 'Morrrows of Morrow County'," explained Miss Kirmis. "Our narrators are Marvin Morrow, age 11 and Mildred Morrow, age 15—both members of the William Morrow family. Connie and Douglas Anderson, 4-H members portray the two Morrow children on a tape recording which is played with the showing of the slides.

Such things as 4-H projects available, meetings, tours, summer school, camp, and fairs are all brought out in this story.

It was shown in connection with National 4-H Club Week, at the Boardman grange, Rhea Creek Grange, and the Chamber of Commerce. It is hoped that all communities may be visited with the program in the near future.

Ione 4-H members along with agents Anderson, Kirmis and Hay appeared before the Ione P-TA on March 9 to explain the projects available under the 4-H program. ### Many Top Barnett Cattle Go On Block Next Monday

Stockmen from all over the northwest are expected to attend an important polled Hereford sale in Gilliam county next Monday, March 21.

Leo Barnett, who with his son Ernie operated Barnett Polled Hereford Ranches at Clem and Boardman, will sell 140 lots of cows, calves, bred and open heifers, range bulls and herd bulls. Also up for sale will be several prize-winning bulls, including BHR Gold Paladin, KP Gold Colonel 1st and BHR Gold Lamplighter. The latter two animals are jointly owned by Barnett and Joyce Livestock Co., Nampa, Idaho.

Around 300 head of polled Herefords are included in the sale, said Barnett. Louie Barnett, a brother, will sell 60 lots in a complete dispersion sale.

Barnett said he is closing out his entire Boardman operation. His herdsman, Ronald Haas, has resigned. The Gilliam breeder will keep about 50 females on the Clem ranch.

Sale will begin at 11 A M, and lunch will be served on the grounds. Barnett ranch is five miles southeast of the 23-mile post on the Arlington-Condon highway.
