

### APPLICATIONS NOW DUE FOR 4-H SUMMER SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS

Applications for 4-H summer school from 4-H boys and girls who have met the requirements to be eligible for this honor are being received now at the county agent's office, announces N C Anderson, county extension agent.

To be eligible, boys and girls must have reached their 13th birthday by January 1, 1960; must have completed at least two years of 4-H club work and finished all projects enrolled in the past current club year. Thirty, the 1960 quota, will be selected from among 83 eligibles when the application deadline is reached, April 1. These boys and girls will spend eight days on the Oregon State College campus living and playing together, attending classes and otherwise carrying out their motto "to make the best better". Scholarships which pay living expenses during the eight days are provided by organizations, individuals and groups interested in the 4-H club program.

The Pine City extension unit again wins the recognition of providing the first 4-H summer school scholarship to be received in 1960. These women have won this recognition for the past five years. Trailing behind by only a few days in providing scholarships are the Ione P-TA and Freddie Nelson, Lexington. Groups that have provided scholarships in the past will be contacted within the next two months by a scholarship committee composed of Marcel Jones, Heppner; E M Baker, Ione; Gene Pierce, Heppner and Mrs Bernard Doherty, Lexington.

Summer school selection committee members, Mrs Walter Corley and Lloyd Morgan, Ione; Alfred Nelson, Jr, Lexington and Mrs George Luciani, Echo will have the difficult job of screening applications from the 83 eligible boys and girls after April 1.

around activities of the club member including projects completed and exhibits made, demonstrations and other public presentations, 4-H contests, tours, camps and summer school participation as well as leadership and 4-H recognition.

### Advance Census Report Forms Now Being Distributed

Advance report forms for the 1960 census of population and housing will be distributed by the post office this week to all households in this area, district supervisor Homer E Rainey, Bend announced today.

The advance report form is a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form before the start of the house-to-house canvass gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member in advance of the census taker's visit. The district supervisor urges all residents to fill out the forms and have them ready for the census takers when they start their rounds on April 1.

The advance report form contains seven questions about every person in the household and six questions about the household's dwelling. The household information asked for is name, address, sex, color or race, month and year of birth, whether married or single, and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is the number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbing, if rented or owned.

At every fourth household, the census taker will seek the answers to additional questions covering population and housing characteristics which are being asked of a 25 percent sample of the nation's population. The sample population questions include inquiries on country of birth, schooling, employment, income, and related items. The additional housing questions relate to rent or value of dwelling, heating equipment, water supply, and other facilities and equipment.

The district supervisor pointed out that information about individuals and their homes furnished to the census bureau is kept confidential under Federal law. Only statistical totals and averages are published. No individual person can be identified in published reports and census information cannot be used for regulation, investigation, or taxation.

### Hearing on School Budget Held Here

About 40 persons attended Wednesday night's public hearing on the proposed county school budget, but no major complaints were raised against it.

Numerous questions were answered by board members and superintendent Robert Van Route. The special building fund serial levy came in for some discussion, and it was pointed out that if approved it will provide \$130,000 a year for four years to be used for school construction in the county.

The vote on the budget and the serial levy will be held April 12.

### First National Branch Reports Increase in Loans

A record high spring bank call deposit total was revealed by First National Bank of Oregon when the statewide bank reported its March 15, 1960 statement of condition figures to the comptroller of the currency.

Deposits of \$836,508,545 were reported, which topped the previous spring mark by more than \$2 million set on March 12, 1959. Loans for the 82 First National offices amounted to \$480,316,922, an increase of \$49 million over a year ago. Both the deposits and loan totals are greater than any other bank in the state.

The Heppner branch of First National reported March 15 deposits of \$5,298,003 and loans totaling \$3,995,341, according to J H Bedford, manager.

At the same time he released comparable totals for the branch for the March 12, 1959 call for bank statements. On that date, deposits were \$5,568,107 and loans were \$3,414,935.

"The deposit and loan totals, up from the high level of a year ago, are a good illustration of the continuing vitality of the state's economy," C B Stephenson, president of the statewide bank said. "The present business activity is reflected in bank deposits, which are up substantially over a year ago, and employment is considerably higher than last spring," he added.

### Workshop For Dressmaking Slated

### Grains Eligible For Reseal and Loan

Farm stored 1959 crop corn, wheat and barley will be eligible to be kept in storage another year under a reseal program when the original loan or purchase agreement expires this year, the county ASC office announces.

In addition, price support reseal loans which are already in effect on 1958 crop wheat and barley will be eligible to be extended another year.

For storing grain under a reseal loan, a farmer may earn storage payments which in effect help to pay the cost of new storage. Storage payments to farmers for the added year will be in line with the new storage rates which are negotiated between the government and commercial warehousemen to take effect July 1, 1960.
