

Green Pitches No-No Game For Heppner Victory

The Heppner High Mustangs split a double bill with the Riverside Pirates last Saturday at Irrigon.

In the first game Mustang pitcher Tom Green threw a no-hitter at the Pirates striking out 15, walking 7 and hitting two batters. Bob Davidson drove in two runs with a triple in the sixth inning to give the Mustangs two runs which clinched the game with an additional run scored by Mike Healy on a single by Tom Glass. The Mustangs only got three runs and four hits but that was enough to win the game 3-0.

In the second game the Mustangs played all their 27 man squad giving substitutes a chance to play. Three Mustang pitchers were hit for 20 runs and six hits and numerous walks were given the Pirates who made use of them in winning the game 20 to 9.

NEW PP&L POWER RATE SCHEDULE GOES INTO EFFECT APRIL 1

Revised electric rates expected to provide Pacific Power & Light Company with additional revenues to help offset post-war increases in construction and operating costs were on file Friday with the state public utility commissioner.

The new schedules will be reflected in service bills received after March 30.

For most residential customers in the local service area, PP&L said, the increases will range from about two cents to seven cents a day, depending upon the amount of electricity used.

The new schedules make available here an "all electric" residential rate which is advantageous for consumers using both an electric range and an automatic water heater.

The company reported uniformity of schedules throughout PP&L's upstate service areas would be achieved, including the elimination of the present difference of about 35 cents a month between rural and urban area residential rates.

Commercial and industrial schedules are also being adjusted and made uniform, with the effect varying because of many differences in individual electric use characteristics and service requirements.

PP&L reported that for households on the new straight residential service rate the cost of 100 kilowatt hours of electricity will be \$3.89. The amount of the increase for customers on the former urban schedule will be 54 cents more a month, and for those on the rural rate 22 cents more. For 200 kilowatt hours, the increase will be 92 cents more than the old urban rate and 57 cents more than the old rural rate.

Kenneth L. Smouse, Ione junior, outlined the program of the conference which was made up of two delegates from each county in Oregon. The delegates were divided into six groups who made hour long visits to the various departments of the state government to hear the head officials tell the duties of their department and to answer questions from their young 4-H guests. Departments visited included agricultural, state police, forestry, finance, education, and supreme court.

Mardine Baker, student at Eastern Oregon College at LaGrande, reported on the interview granted each delegate in order to select two Oregon delegates to represent Oregon at the national 4-H conference in Washington, D. C.

Members of the North Morrow 4-H council met on March 22 in the home economics room of the Boardman school. Besides the 4-H speakers, a filmstrip on "Demonstrate the 4-H Way" was shown by Esther Kirmis who led a discussion on how to prepare a 4-H demonstration. Leaders were informed that they would have a quota of nine students they might send to 4-H summer school at Oregon State College in June.

South Morrow 4-H council met on Thursday evening, March 24 at the Marcel Jones home south of Heppner. In addition to the "Know Your State Government" talks, Glenn Campbell reported on possibilities of building sleeping shelters at the 4-H camp at Cutsforth Park.

County agents, Kirmis and Hay announced that the south end of the county had a quota of 21 delegates they might send to 4-H summer school.

The agents showed colored slides on Chatcolab, a recreational training camp near Plummer, Idaho. Chatcolab, held May 14, is a cooperative recreational workshop which is open to leaders from any interested organizations. Further information on this school can be obtained from the local county extension office.
