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Fire Prevention Meetings Are Slated During April

N. C. Anderson and Joe Hay, Morrow county extension agents, will be holding public meetings on "Fire Prevention in the Home" during the month of April. These meetings are being sponsored by the county home extension units, according to Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agent.

The majority of fires can be traced to human carelessness or neglect. To prevent fire loss people must achieve understanding of the habit of being careful.

The program scheduled for these meetings will include the review of the booklet, "Prevention of Fire in the Home" and a discussion of the purposes and operations for the rural volunteer fire department, newly organized in the county last spring.

A color film, "Fire on the Farm" produced by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, will be shown. This shows fire prevention methods and principles of good fire protection that will reduce the danger of serious or total losses from fires on the farm.
