

Records Fall At Saturday Meet

Willow Creek Invitational track meet saw three new Heppner high records go down in the books. Tom Driscoll set two records, one in the broad jump 20' 8 1/4", and one in the 120 yd high hurdles with a time of 16.6. The other record was in the 880 yd relay with a time of 1:41.0. This was set by Dennis Doherty, Jim Steagall, Tom Howell and Tom Driscoll.

Driscoll and Howell tied for the top honors, each scoring 15 1/2 points and Pat Farley of Arlington was third with 14 3/4 points.

Scoring for the meet was based on the 5 points for first, 4 for second, 3 for third, 2 for fourth, and one for fifth.

Conservation Stamp Due Out Next Week

Supporters of the Heppner soil conservation district and persons interested in commemorative stamps will be able to purchase a 4-cent water conservation postage stamp locally starting April 19, Ralph Richards, conservationist, said today.

Although the post office department is printing 120 million copies of the 3-color water conservation stamp, the edition may not last long, Richards said.

The stamp is being issued at Washington, D C, on April 18 as a tribute to conservation farmers and their local soil conservation districts and watershed projects.

"I'm sure that most everyone in the Heppner district will want to buy these colorful and historical stamps when they go on sale here," Richards said.

Those who are interested in a "first-day cover", a souvenir envelope, can mail addressed envelopes plus money order or certified check for the number of stamps required to the postmaster at Washington, D C, who will place the water conservation stamp on the envelopes, cancel with a special cancellation mark used only on that day and at that place, and mail as addressed anywhere in the country, Richards pointed out.

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STATE EMBARKS ON LAKE BUILDING; BULL PRAIRIE TO BE FIRST EFFORT

Approval of the creation of Bull Prairie lake in the Umatilla national forest south of Heppner embarked the game commission on a new venture of building man-made lakes for expanding angling population.

Bull Prairie was assured when the game commission at its March meeting set aside \$58,000 for cooperative development with the forest service of the man-made impoundment to be created specifically for recreationists. Located south of Heppner the lake will provide trout angling in an area where no lakes now exist.

Bull Prairie will be the first development of some 14 additional sites established as a priority list for possible future development. The list approved by the commission includes sites from all regions of the state where fishery technicians examined and sifted many possibilities. By creating the priority list of sites now the commission felt

there would be no waiting to pick and choose as the occasion arises or as funds become available. At its meeting the commission authorized funds for complete investigative work on all potential sites on the list including engineering and cost analysis. Some of the sites selected may not prove acceptable.
